# **AUTHOR ACCUSED**

This is not the first litigation that has followed the literary effort of Dr. Le Sueur. Pollowing his criticism of the life of Mackenzie, written by Dr. Hughes, in which he charged that the Toronto educationist had dealt with his subject too much from the conventional standpoint, Dr. Le Sueur secured a contract from the Morang people to write the life for publication in their scries of 'Makers of Canada.' For this purpose he secuted access to the documents and records in question, but on the completion of his work the publishers declined to take or issue it on the ground that it was not a fair or proper treatment, and was out of touch with books already published on Mackenzie's life and work. On these grounds they refused to return the manuscript, and Le Sueur brought action against Morang & Company to recover it.
