It appears that the two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Andrews was entrusted with a box o tablets, which contained a percentage tablets, which contained a percentage of strychnine, and being sugar-coated the child ate seven or eight of the tempting looking tablets and soon developed symptoms of strychnine poisoning. Medical aid was summoned and hopes are now entertained for its recovery.

London, Feb. 1.—(C. A. P.)—Lord Hugh Cecil, M.P. (Conservative free trader), speaking at Preston, said Mr. Chamberlain's whole scheme was one to divide the Empire into class one to divide the Empire into classes with conflicting interests. He believed every word Mr. Chamberlain had spoken had done harm to the cause of union within the Empire. He did not think the country would accept the protectionist trine, but would hold to that commercial system which was charter of justice and freedom.

Want London Capital. London, Feb. 1.—(C. A. P.)—The A.P. learns that three agents of the concessionaries of the proposed Nova Scotia Eastern Railway has for months past been attempting to raise capital in London to start operations. The agents have directly approached several likely financiers, but so far have been unsuccessful.
