PREPARING FOR SPRING.

Where the sedges wilt and wither, exposing the hard, frozen earth, and where the leaves have been soaked with the rain or carried away by the searching winds, the elaborate preparations for a new season are freely revealed. The wintergreen pays no attention to the penetrating frosts that congeal the moist earth about its roots and solidify the lingering foliage of most of its forest neighbors. Its scarlet and green, its mild flavor and pleasant aroma remain as in summer. But in the open spaces the artistic rosettes of fresh leaves show a thoughful regard for the coming season of repose. The eventhe artistic rosettes of fresh leaves show a thoughtful regard for the coming season of repose. The evening primrose spreads a most handsome circle of pale green leaves, in no way suggesting the tall, irregularly-podded stalk and perfumed yellow flowers of summer. The slender waisted and pointed leaves radiate from the deep, fleshy root, making a circle sometimes a foot in diameter. Each circle of leaves grows regularly shorter, right in to the cluster of points in the centre, the whole rosette lying flat and even on the ground, prepared to sleep under the white coverlet till spring. These recumbent circles of pointed leaves are among the most decorative preparations for the season to come. They lend a charm even to the frozen ground by their symmetrical outlines and torpid promise of renewed life. In the spring they will speedily wither as the strong, coarse stalk rises from the ground, and some of the euter points of the circles are already turning brown. But their tenacity is still a contrast with the delicate yellow flower that open but for a night and wither in the morndelicate yellow flower that open but for a night and wither in the morn-ing. The opening of an evening prim-rose is one of the treats of late sum-mer, when, with the settling of darkless, the coarse, budded, and weedy plant suddenly becomes fragrant with delicate, slender, tubular flowers. Although they live but a single night and wither on the coarse seed pod: in the morning, there are other buds developing from day to day to per-fume the air of evening on into-the

There are other decorative rosettes nestling close on the hard, frozen surface. The viper's bugloss, branded by an unsympathetic community as a moxious weed, in spite of the bright picturesque aspect of its blue, bristling spikes of flowers, appears like dark green stars under the withered grass and sedges. Its coarser and bristling texture distinguishes it from the evening primrose. In summer it displays a decorative scheme peculiarly its own, coarsely picturesque, with unfolding spikes of small blue tubular flowers relieved by pink buds and red protruding stamens. But the best time to study the wild flowers is all the year round. The shepherd's purse, more conspicuous There are other decorative resettes shepherd's purse, more conspicuous as a weed than as a flower, now takes on a fine rosette form and lies close to the ground, its deeply-lobe leaves in a less regular circle presenting an excellent decorative circut. In summer its little two-lobed, purse-like seed pods will be more conspicuous than its diminutive white flowers. Just now it is at its best flowers. Just now it is at it's best. The saxifrage spreads a little ir regular bunch of leaves on the ground, seeming eager for a chance to hide away under the snow. These leafy circles appear like hopeful claims staked out for flowering spaces in the spring. The treasure located there is the mystery of life. Where it is not sustained in the vigorous evergreens, the surviving circles of leaves, or the hidden roots that endure the winter, it, lives in the inert seeds that have been scattered and hidden in infinite variety in every crevice of the receptive earth. It seems strange that every feet of the residuly from that eyery foot of that selidly-frozen surface is instinct with life, dormant for the moment, but ready to renew its infinitude of activities with the changing seasons. "There is no death; what seems so is transition."

any Changes at Windsor Castle Stable ince the Death of Her Late Majesty Queen Victoria.

There have been many changes There have been many changes at Windsor Castle since the death of Queen Victoria, writes Correspondent W. E. Curtis. Nearly all the members of her household, her attendants and servants, have been retired and pensioned off, and Parliament made a grant of \$100,000 a year to give them annuities. Even her horses them annuities. Even her horses have been turned out to grass and

have been turned out to grass and will never wear harness again.

Sands, Queen Victoria's old coachman, who drove her for more than 40 years, and without whom sho would not go out in a carriage, may be seen daily upon the streets of Windsor, and if you can warm him up a little he will relate ancedotes of the late Queen by the hour. He is retired on a pension of \$750 and has been given a little cottage on the royal estates at Eton to live in Sands never drove anybody but the Sands never drove anybody but th Queen and was subject to her orders exclusively. For 40 years he has never mounted a box unless she was never mounted a box unless she was in the carriage, and it was probably true, as stated, that she never rode unless he held the reins. Although she was very stout, Queen Victoria was in the habit of riding horseback up to a few years before her death. Even when she was over 75 years of age she frequently mounted the saddle with the faithful Sands at her side, and rode slowly around the riding hall at Windsor or among the paths upon the palace grounds. She considered it the best form of exercise.

The riding hall at Windsor is a building 150 by 75 feet in size, with a floor covered with tan bark. There a floor covered with tan bark. There all the horses belonging to the coyal family are educated in a very severe school. Most of them are bred in the royal stables at Hampton. They are broken with the greatest care, and are taught to behave themselves under all circumstances so that nothing frightens them. They are accustomed to be a constant of the ing frightens them. They are accustomed to having military bands and fifes playing around them, firecrackers and rockets shot off under their noses, and flags waved in their eyes, so that when they go out in processions, as they are required to do frequently, they will not be disturbed by the demonstrations.

All the horses in the stables are trained in a sirellar manner and trained in a sirellar manner and

rained in a similar manner, and trained in a similar manner, and Queen Victoria took a great personal interest in that business. There is a little balcony inclosed with glass overhanging the riding hall, in which she used to sit for hours watching the grooms train her horses and the little princes and princesses learning to ride. Every member of the royal family is countered to ing to ride. Every member of the royal family is accustomed to the saddle, and the little children of the Prince of Wales, now only 4 or 5 years old, are required to take lessons from the riding master twice a day. They have a pair of pretty Shetland ponies, and drive them in little carts. Queen Victoria had a team of eight cream-colored ponies, beautiful little animals, almost as small as dogs, which now belong to Queen Alexandra, who drives them tandem and is learning to drive them four-in-hand.

While he is at Windsor the King of England never drives after anything but grey horses, nor do other members of the rotal family, and none but cream-colored horses are used on state occasions. The King has one black and three bay saddle horses, however.
