Use the solution twice a day until the navel is perfoct-ly healed. Scours in Calves.-Never give milk to a calf in a dirty pail. Dirty pails, over-feeding with skimmed and sours in calves. A good remedy for scours is to quit giving skim milk, but give a pint of new milk, in which is stired a small handful of powdered charceal. Continue this treatment until the calf recovers.-H.
