Arrival of the Steamer. THREE DAYS LATER FROM LIVERPOOL. The Pacific arrived from New York on Sunday, at half-past one, P.M., having sailed from Liverpool on the 19th.

Antisocial. As most of our contemporaries have expressed an opinion with respect to the rumored intention, on the part of the British Government, to purchase the Island of Anticosti from Canada, with the purpose of forming a convict settlement thereon, we suppose we shall be expected to give our opinion on the matter.

It appears from the evidence adduced on the part of the prosecution, that on the night of the 27th August last, between 12 and 2 o'clock at night, the prisoner and another man were together in a cabin, in the ship the "Gazette" in a decidedly in favor of it. We confess that when we first heard of the matter, we were inclined to agree with the Herald, and we are still, to a certain extent, of that opinion.

But if Anticosti is designed to be a convict settlement, like those in Australia, in which tickets of leave will be given, and if prisoners, sentenced for terms of seven, and fourteen, and twenty-one years, are to be sent there, and after the expiration of that term, to be let loose on the British Provinces, then we do most decidedly object to such a plan, and protest against it in the name of the people of Canada.

For the defence, it was argued that the prisoner by the tender of the 1st 3d, had discharged his obligation to the law, and that he was entitled to be set at liberty. It was also argued that the prisoner had been wrongfully confined, and that he was entitled to be set at liberty.

Mr. Justice Aylwin charged the jury, and commented very severely on the line of defence that had been set up. He characterized it as extraordinary, and said that he had never seen a case in which a man had refused to accept of a legal tender for a doubtfully legal bargain, that that should be an excuse for stabbing.

Mr. Justice Aylwin—You have nothing to say, Sir. The jury returned a verdict of guilty. The prisoner was sentenced to be hanged.

THE QUEEN vs. H. J. JACKSON.—The Solicitor General moved that the prisoner be placed at the bar on Monday next, on the charge of being a felon.

Mr. Justice Aylwin declined to do so, and stated that in the exercise of a sound discretion the Court would not take up the case of parties who had not been tried.

Proposed Steam Line from Liverpool to the Canadian West Coast. We are informed that a Scheme is now privately in agitation for the constitution of a Line of Steam Ships, of large carrying capacity, between the Mersey and Quebec, in order to promote the trade of the Canadian Provinces, and the conveyance of Emigrants and Passengers to the Settlements of the Far West of Canada and the United States.
