The Rowellite policy is to abolsh the bar and to leave the liquor hops open. The Whitney Government polcy has been, and is, to give the

strictest possible enforcement to Local Option and Canada Temperance Acts where adopted shops included), and to continually frame more forward temperance legislation.

It is vitally essential that a sufficient majority should be back of abolition in any community, or else the enactment becomes more or less of a farce and liquor sellng and duplicity exist in the worst possible form.
