

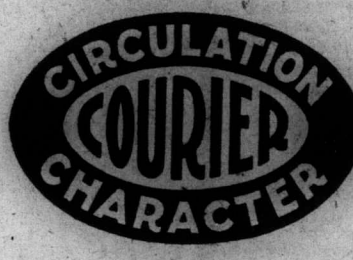

GRIM ROMANCE ATTACHED TO SUB CAMPAIGN

German Commander of U-Boat Murdered Girl He Hoped to Wed

AA Atlantic Post.—Lars Larsen, an elderly man, but still vigorous and erect, who arrived here aboard a small cargo steamship, told a story of U-boat romance which, for dramatic interest, is perhaps unparalleled by anything ever narrated concerning the submarine warfare of afloat.

Mr. Larsen was an officer aboard the Swedish steamship Ada, which was on her way from Gothenburg, Sweden, to Hull, England. At first Mr. Larsen parried questions in regard to his experience with submarines, by saying that the memories were too bitter, and he was trying hard to banish them from his mind, but finally, he consented to speak. Following is his story:

"Before the war began a handsome young German became acquainted with my son Swen, and before long, was a frequent caller at our home in Stockholm. He fell in love with my daughter, Minna, who was sixteen years old and considered very beautiful. The German, Hans von Tuebinger, was an art student, and had come to Sweden to study some phase of his art, which he said he could not find in any other country. I never understood exactly what that phase was; but, at any rate, it was the means of bringing unhappiness to me and to the girl. I did not know that he was the innocent instrument in the hands of a relentless fate, and that he would gladly have sacrificed the girl to which he was the unwilling cause.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN SOLUBLE WEST LAND REGULATIONS
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District, duty by proxy may be made on certain conditions on certain conditions in each of these years.

Fresh
French Attack in Belgium Union With British; Carry out Objectives, Crossing Steenbeek

Paris, Aug. 16.—The French made an attack on the Aisne and captured the Steenbeek River, the office announced to-day. Full progress is being made at the river.

The statement follows: "In Belgium, after a most thorough preparation, we made an attack at dawn this morning in conjunction with the British on our right. With superb skill our infantry made the assault on the enemy's positions, both sides of the road between Steenbeek and Dixmude, turning all objectives and crossing the Steenbeek. Our troops are making progress on right bank, in contact with allies.

South of Ailles, a violent attack was made on a line of trenches on a front one kilometre, which was strongly by the enemy. German counter-attacks and new positions were repulsed, and 120 prisoners, of them an officer, were counted. In the region of Hurbise, however, we made progress, taking a number of prisoners. "In the Champagne, both banks of the Meuse, the artillery fighting continues. German counter-attacks on the Louvemont, taking seven prisoners. There is nothing of importance to report on the main front. "Our bombing air last night and this morning threw many bombs on establishments, north and south of the railway station Lichtenwald. "During our attack in the region of Ailles and Hurbise, the weather was very favourable.
