The result has been that the organization in each province practically fell into the hands of a very few. At today's meeting, after considerable discussion, it was decided that Sir Wilfrid should write to a number of leading men in each province requesting them to organize upon a plan and at a time satisfactory to themselves and advise him of the steps taken.

The delegation from Ontario ex plained that they intended to prepare now a moderate form of organization by dividing the province into districts. It is expected that each of 30 constituencies will shortly send six or eight delegates to meet in London and organize a consultative committee for that part of the province. Once that is done, 18 ridings in Eastern Ontario is done, 18 ridings in Eastern Ontario will do similarly, and afterwards the plan will be applied to Northern Ontario, Central Ontario, the Yorks and Toronto. There will be five bodies in all in the province. Representatives from these bodies will be appointed to form a central committee which will maintain a central office in Toronto to furnish information and direct the organization. It is expected that a similar plan will be followed in other provinces especially west of the Great Lakes, but the party there will decide for itself.

The central information office at Offawa will be maintained, but will have to do with collecting information rather than attending to organization.
