



Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take expurchased homestead in certain districts Price \$3.00 per acre.

The acres of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, shrubby or any land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

BUSINESS PROFITS TAX NOT TO BE DISCONTINUED

Representations are being made by the liberal Press that the Business Profits Tax is not to be continued. This is absolutely incorrect as is shown by the following statement made by Sir Thomas White as it appears in Hansard:

The Business Profits Tax, by its terms comes to an end on December 31st of this year. When that measure was introduced it was thought the war would be at an end by that time. I stated expressly the other day that we should tax abnormal profits resulting from the war, and in the next Budget that I bring down we shall deal with that matter.

Mr. Pardee: Will there be a renewal? Sir Thomas White: I have stated that next year taxation will be imposed on excess business profits. I stated also the other day that it might be necessary to make some allowance for necessary plant extensions, but I laid down the principle as strongly as I could that abnormal business profits due to the war must be abnormally taxed.

Toronto, Sept. 26—Alexander Auer a Finlander was sentenced by Magistrate Denison to two years in penitentiary for making seditious statements contrary to the defence of the realm act. The charge was the result of information given by Bruce Conklin a citizen of the United States who related that Auer, on reading the story in the Evening Telegram that the Swedish consul in Argentina had carried cable messages to Germany said that a bomb should be placed under a paper that printed such a story, and that if any attempt to conscript him were made, he would shoot the highest officer he met.

Chicago, Sept. 26—A cable despatch to the Chicago Daily News from its correspondent dated at the Hague, Holland today says—"I am informed a responsible resource that the Austrian governments is exerting pressure on Prussia to make peace along the lines suggested by the Entente. It is hinted that Bulgaria and Turkey are supporting the Austrian position which has the moral. Should Prussia prove obdurate German states will seek political connection with Austria and form a new group of States.

There are more than 800 members of the United States flying corps in training with the Canadian branch of the Imperial (Royal) Flying Corps in Canada. They are nearly all graduates of U. S. A. universities, including Princeton Harvard and Yale. There are about 200 being trained as pilots; they are now cadets. Arrangements were made by the British war Office and the war department of the United States for the training to be carried out in Canada. Many of the American lads are sons of famous prominent in the financial, industrial and social life of the United States. One of the cadets is the son of a Congressman. They are all going to Texas when the migration of the Royal Flying Corps south takes place.

HOME-MADE DRIER

Dimensions—height 36 inches, width 36 inches, height 36 inches high, sheet iron. toward the bottom, openings for ventilation on four sides. Of the back like frame made of one-half inch strips of wood quarter-inch strips serving as cleats on which the trays in the order rest.

These are placed at intervals of three inches. The frame is covered with tin or galvanized sheet iron, which is tacked to the wooden strips of the frame. Thin strips of wood may be used, instead. The door is fitted on small hinges and fastened with a thumb latch. It opens wide so that the trays may be removed easily.

The first tray is placed three inches above the radiator. The trays rest on the cleats three inches apart. A drier of the given dimensions will hold eight trays. The frame of the tray is made of one-inch strips on which is tacked galvanized screen wire, which forms the bottom of the tray. The tray is 21-5 inches.

The lowest tray when placed in the drier is pushed to the back, leaving the three-inch space in front. The next tray is placed even with the front, leaving a three-inch space in the back. The other trays alternate in the same way. A ventilator opening is left in the top of the drier, through which the most air may pass away.

The principal construction is that currents of heated air pass over the product as well as up through it, gathering the moisture and passing away. The movement of the current of air induces a more rapid and uniform drying. The upper trays may be shifted to the lower part of the drier and the lower trays to the upper part as drying proceeds, so as to dry the product uniformly throughout.

If drying is done a cookstove oven, leave oven door ajar. Note temperature of oven often. Trays for use in the oven may be made by using a convenient sized piece of galvanized wire screen and bending the edge one or two inches.

DISCOVER ANTHRACITE COAL IN N.B. Tests Made Show it to Produce Intense Heat and is Almost Odorless and Clinkerless

FREDERICTON, N. B., September 28—Anthracite coal discovered fifty miles from the city is the joyful news floating about here today. Captain Russel Bellaney of New York city, a student and geologist has had a license from the New Brunswick government to explore for silver which, he believed was to be found in the Salmon river district of Queens county. His investigations brought him to a strata which proves to be coal very closely resembling the anthracite of Pennsylvania fields. Tests made show it to produce an intense heat. It ignites quickly and burns slowly. It is estimated conservatively that there is at least a half a million tons in sight. Underlying is a strata of black-smith coal.
