The State of New York has received needs helping out. a land grant of 800,000 acres; Pennsylvania, 700,000; and Ohio, 400,000 acres. The United States government has paid in cash to colleges, \$15,000,000, and granted lands valued at \$16,000,-000. Its cash grant in 1908 was \$2,-500.000.
