Boers Made a Determined Attack on Their Position.

Enemy Repulsed With Heavy Loss-Lieuts. Burch and Borden Among Our Killed.

London, July 19 .- The War Office has received the following despatch from Lord Roberts :-

"Pretoria, July 18. — Yesterday the enemy made a determined attack on the left of Pole-Carew's position and along our left flank, commanded by

"The post held by the Irish Fusiliers and the Canadian Mounted Infantry, under Lt.-Col. Alderson, was most gallantly defended.

"The enemy made repeated attempts to assault the positions, coming in close range and calling to the Fusiliers to surrender.

"The enemy suffered severely. They had fifteen killed and fifty wounded and four were taken prisoners.

"The British casualties were seven killed, including the Ganadian Lieutenants Borden and Burch, thirty wounded and twenty-one missing.

"Ian Hamilton's column advanced to Waterval yesterday unopposed, and to-day proceeded to Haman's Krail.

"Fifteen hundred Boers, with five guns, managed to break through the cordon formed by Hunter's and Rundle's divisions between Bethlehem and Ficksburg. They were making to-

Ficksburg. They were making to-wards Lindley, closely followed by Pa-get's and Broadwood's brigades."

That the Legationers May Not Have Been Massacred.

ese Officials Insist They Were Safe as Late as July 9.

Washington, July 19.—The State Department has received a despatch from Consul-General Fowler, at Che Foo, saying that the Governor of Shan-Tung wires that his courier left Pekin on July 9. The legations were still holding cut. The buoyant and hopeful feeling of yesterday as to the Chinese situation has been strengthened by the addition of a confirmatory despatch from Consul Fowler, at Che-Foo, touching the safety of the legationers at Pekin on July 9. Of course, it is understood that Mr. Fowler's information came from the same fountainhead as did Minister Wu's of yesterday, namely, the famous Yuan-Shinsame fountainhead as did Minister Wu's of yesterday, namely, the famous Yuan-Shih-Kai, the military governor of Shan-Tung province. Because of the very intimate relations that have existed up to a very recent date between this official and the imperial court at Pekin, he having been commanded by the imperial body guard, there is a disposition here to attach more credence to his despatches than would be accorded to those of other Chinese officials. This is based on the presumption that he This is based on the presumption that he has no inducement to falsify the facts.

He Urged the Threne to Appease the Powers,

Japs Led the Way in the Attack on the Walled City of Tien Tsin.

London, July 19 .- A despatch from Canton gives some additional facts relative to the memorial to the throne which Li Hung Chang told the foreign consuls he, as doyen of the viceroys, had i nduced all the other viceroys except two, to frame, as reported in the Daily Telegraph's Canton despatch of July 16. The memorial insisted upon the necessity of five points, as follows: - "First-Protection of foreigners in the Empire, wnether war breaks out or not, in order to preserve China's prestige as a civilized state. Second— The rescue of foreign ministers still The rescue of foreign ministers still living, as negotiations would then still be possible and the governments of those saved might use their influence in favor of China. Third—tA letter of apology to the German Emperor for the murder of Baron von Ketteler, as well as a porposal for the mediation of other powers and a written assurof other powers, and a written assur-ance of China's good intentions, to be given to the United States and France. Fourth—All compensation for all losses of lives and property of for-eigners. Fifth—Orders to be given to the military and civil authorities of Chi-Li to punish robbers and maraud-ing troops." Li Hung Chang added in his interview with the foreign consuls that in the event that the lega-tions were saved, the United States Great Britain and France had promis

London, July 19 .- In the House of Commons Parliamentary Secretary Broderick read a despatch from Admiral Seymour, duted at Taku, July 15, giving an account of the capture of the native city of Tien Tsin by the allied forces. According to this despatch, on the morning of July 14 the spatch, on the morning of July 14 the Japanese blew up the gate and entered the city, the others following. On the right the Russians captured a battery on the bank of the Liu-Taio Canal, consisting of twelve small guns. The other troops were all engaged on the left. About 8,000 in all were engaged, and over 700 were killwere engaged and over 700 were killed or wounded, the Japanese being the heaviest losers. The British had twenty killed and 93 wounded. The Chinese troops fled, in what direction is not known. s not known

hands of the allies." The German commander also says: "Regular rail-road communication between Taku and Tien Tsin will be opened on July 18. It was decided that the senior officers of the station should have military control of the line until it could be handed over to the ordinary authorities. The British admiral wished it to be handed over at once. The Russians have repaired the line and now occupy it."
