SENATE FOR HIM

Archie Campbell's Political Pull Likely to Block Mr. Calvert's Aspirations to Upper House

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Hon. R. F. Sutherland, Speaker of the House of Commons, was in the city to-day. So was Mr. Calvert, the chief Liberal whip. Their presence suggested at first that the Government had decided upon the exact date for the opening of Parliament, but this, it is learned, has not yet been determined. Mr. Calvert has other political interests, however, which may account for his being here. It is known that he has had the promise of the vacant Ontario Senatorship, but it now develops that Mr. Archie Campbell can only be mollified for the disappointment of his Cabinet ambitions by appointment to the Upper House, and so strong is Mr. Campbell's pull that the chief whip is likely to be requested, for the sake of the peace of the party in Ontario, to forego for the present his aspirations to retirement to the Red Chamber.

Discontent among the Ontario Liberal members at the appointment of Hon. Mr. Graham has by no means subsided, so that the situation likely to be created by any solution of the Senate issue at present probable is sure to prove interesting. The vacancy in the Quebec judiciary caused by the resignation of Judge Larue, of Rimouski, has been filled by the appointment to the bench for that district of Hon. Auguste Tassier, Provincial Treasurer of Quebec. It is understood that Mr. Tassier will be succeeded in the Quebec Cabinet by Mr. Alex. Tassier, M. L. A., formerly law partner in the firm of Fitzpatrick and Parent.
