### WHAT TO EAT.

A , Melon Salad the Latest Gastre

A melon salad is not often seen though regarded by those who have tried it as a highly satisfactory way of serving this delicious fruit, especially when, as sometimes happens, it is not as full flavored as one could wish. Cut the fruit in cubes, being careful to exclude all hard rind. Make a dressing of olive oil, which for this purpose should be specially good, and white wine or not too strong vinegar, in the

proportion of at least three tablespoor fuls of oil to one of vinegar, a quarter of a saltspoonful of pepper and half a saltspoonful of sait. Mix these well together and pour over the melon. Serve very cold in a salad bowl, or, for a novelty, it may be served from the shell of the melon from which the soft nart of the fruit has been cut. Sprinkle this salad with a little chopped green tarragon, the delicate flavor of which blends particularly well with that of the melon. Garnish with lettuce hearts or any greenery at hand.

Salmon souffles are wonderfully good.

Take one-half pound of cooked salmon, two hard boiled eggs, anchovy essence, a gill of fish stock, one-quarter sunce of gelatin, half a pint of whipped cream, salt and a tiny pinch of cayenne. Pound the fish to a paste, then add the yolks of the eggs and the whites after chopping and rubbing through a sieve. Now add the anchovy paste and season-ing, moistening it with the stock in which the gelatin has been dissolved; when cold mix in the whipped cream top of small souffle cases, fill these an

inch or so above the edge with a mixture, smoothing the top neatly with a knife; decorate with hard boiled egg and chopped water cress or with tiny sprigs of water cress or chervil; set on ice till serving time, then carefully remove the papers and use.

Veal cake is a useful dish for pic-

nics. There are various ways of making it, according to whether a rich, substantial dish is required for some special occasion or whether the purpose is merely to utilize a few slices of veal. One of the simplest modes is to cut the roast veal into slices, lay these in a mold alternately with a few slices of ham or tongue and between the layers, which should be well seasoned with pepper, intersperse thin slices of hard boiled egg. When the mold is full, pour in a little rich stock or good gravy. Bake for half an hour and turn out when cold. Another way is to mince a pound of lean veal and half a pound of streaky bacon; add to them a tablespoonful of mushroom

catchup, a gill of veal stock, the grated rind of half a lemon, parsley, a sea-soning of salt and paprika; press the mixture into a well buttered mold or basin, the inside of which may be decorated with slices of hard boiled egg, etc., cover with buttered paper and bake in a moderate oven for an hour and a half; turn out when quite cold and garnish with some butterfly slices

STRIKERS WRECK STORE

Refuse to Accept Award Made Ly the Mexican President.

Mexican President.

City of Mexico, Jan. 9.—Late Monday word was received here that the textile workers in the mills in the City of Orizaba, State of Vera Cruz, who are on a strike, had burned a company store, and were threatening to destroy the mills. Two regiments of soddiers were assembled and rushed to the scene aboard a special train.

The mills where the trouble occurred employ about 5,000 men. On Friday last it was announced that the strike of the textile workers, which had spread throughout the republic,

had spread throughout the republic, had been settled owing to the intervention of President Diaz and Vice President Corrales.

The owner of the property thus far destroyed is Eduardo Garcin, a citizen of France. The trouble started on Saturday morning, when 2 000 work-Saturday morning, when 2,000 workers met in Rio Blanco, near Orizaba, and voted not to accept the ward of President Diaz. Violent speeches were made and the men arming themselves with sticks and stones looted the com-pany's store, destroyed it and confis-cated thousands of dollars in money

cated thousands of dollars in money and goods. They then pillaged private houses and Government shops.

30 Dead At Arizaba.

Belated reports from the mill district of Arizaba, State of Vera Cruz, indicate that the Government is now complete master of the situation.

To gain control of the rioters, however, it was necessary for the troops to fire on the men. Thirty dead have been counted, while over 80 are reported wounded. It is believed that the strike has been broken.
