Local and Provincial.

The public schools resume work next Monday.

The union meetings have been very well attended in Wolfville this year and have been of the usual interest. The last meeting will be held in the Baptist church this evening.

Change of sailings of Prince Rupert between Digby and St. John went into effect Monday, January 3d, after which date she will leave St. John for Digby on Monday, Tuesday and Friday, returning leaves Digby for St. John on Monday, Thursday and Saturday.

The participating couple were among the most brilliant and popular members of last year's graduating class at Acadia, and their alliance proves that Cupid as well as Minerva may hold sway in the class room where co-education prevails. Hon. Mr Fisher, Minister of agriculture, and Professor Robertson, Shutt and Fletcher will be invited to attend the approaching annual meeting of the Fruit Growers' Association. President Trotter, of Acadia, will deliver an address. There will be original papers by leading fruit growers, and free discussion of subjects of vital importance to this great industry. The meetings will be held in College Hall.

A Christmas tree was held on Friday evening last in the Mission Hall, when gifts of various kinds were distributed to those who have been in attendance. There was a large number present and an enjoyable time was spent by all. The mission was organized a little over a year ago, under the superintendence of Mr Noble Crandall. A sad fatality occurred in the lumber woods at South Alton last Thursday by which James Chase, of White Rock, met with injuries which resulted in his death on Saturday morning. The deceased was engaged in felling a large tree when a limb from another tree which had been lodged in it struck him on the head fracturing the skull and causing other injuries. It was hoped at first that he would recover but after lingering until Saturday morning he died, as stated above. Mr A. J. Woodman drove out for the remains on Saturday night and the funeral took place on Monday morning, being largely attended. Mr Chase was well-known in Wolfville, having spent all his life in this vicinity, and was esteemed as a hard-working, industrious, honest man. He was 45 years of age and leaves a widow and four children, who have the sympathy of all.

The monthly meeting of the town council was held on Tuesday evening. The Mayor and all the councillors were present with the recorder. The various standing committees presented reports. The street committee reported that a contract had been made with Capt. J. E. Eagles for team to use the snow plow at the rate of 25c. per hour for one horse and 35c. per hour for two horses, under the direction of the Supt. of Streets.

The Mayor presented a report of the general condition of the town at the close of the year, and made a number of suggestions regarding the different services of the town and the work that had been done during the year. This report appears in full in another column.

Council adjourned till Friday to consider the new bye-laws.
