HANTS CO. BAPTISTS MEET AT SOMERVILLE

Governments Urged to Unite Forces and Wipe Out Rum-Running Disgrace

SOMERVILLE, May 14.—The Baptists of Hants county met on Monday and Tuesday with the church at Somerville. On Monday evening Rev. F. S. Kinley, of Windsor, gave an address on "The Appeal of Jesus". At the Tuesday morning session very encouraging reports were heard from the churches and the closing hour was occupied with a symposium on "Personal Evangelism".

At the afternoon session Mrs. Judson Shaw, of Windsor Forks, the county secretary of the U.B.W.M.U., presided. The local C.G.I.T. girls and the Mission Band added some pleasing numbers to the program. Miss Bessie Lockhart, a returned missionary gave an interesting and profitable address on religious work in India. At the closing session in the evening Rev. Z. L. Fash, of Hantsport, preached a strong sermon from the text, "Sir, we would see Jesus".

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

President—Rev. Z. L. Fash.

Vice-President—George Brydon, of Newport.

Secretary-Treasurer—Rev. F. S. Kinley.

In the report of the resolutions committee, the following resolutions were heartily adopted:

"Resolved, that the Baptists of Hants county re-affirm their well known opposition to the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, and urge upon those in authority a strict and impartial enforcement of the Temperance Act upon our statute books.

"Further resolved, that we hereby declare our opposition to the liquor importing warehouses in our province as encouraging illicit liquor traffic.

"Further resolved, that we loudly and emphatically proclaim against the disgraceful and degrading rum-running business which has become so strongly entrenched in our province and which is bound increasingly to bring shame and sorrow to our people, if it is not overcome.

"Further resolved, that we call upon our Provincial and Dominion Governments to unite their forces to wipe out this disgrace to our fair land and this insult to a friendly nation.

"Further resolved, that we urge in the coming elections that our people vote for men of well known and tried temperance principles."

DIARY OF MARGARET D. MICHENER

Oct. 15th, 1850. This is a cold cloudy afternoon; it has been gloomy weather since Saturday, and suits my mood well. I sometimes feel quite cheerful and contented, then again when I think of things past, when I have enjoyed Simeon's society, I am very far from feeling contented. On Sunday Rev. Angel preached a good sermon from the text, "He had on his head many crowns". After meeting I went up to father's and stayed till 11 morning. Upon returning, my house seems desolate indeed. I hope Rebecca can come a while. I sent her word yesterday.

16th. Rebecca came just as I was done writing. I am very glad to have her here. Simeon and Elder were together so much we could hardly think of one without the other. Thomas has just left Halifax in hope, but Simeon is gone. I have been over to Emily Ann's; she seems very near to me for Simeon loved her so; I think she feels his loss deeply. Oh, I am wicked! I sometimes feel to envy Maria the hope she has of Curry coming home; but cease my wicked heart; and I pray for grace to submit to this stroke. We cannot have all things our own way.

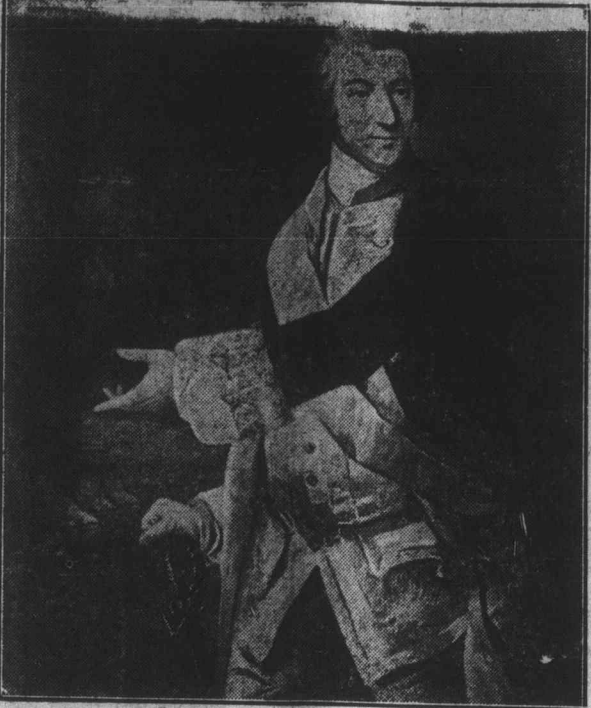
17th. Clear, fine weather for a change. Mrs. James has just been in with Ellen and Nancy Dickie. Oh, how I felt to see them. I could not be composed when I thought of the many happy hours I had spent in their company with Simeon. How changed are my prospects since we last met. I have written to Maria Dickie, Nancy and Ellen came through last night to attend a lecture at the school house by Mr. Gosse, and he is going with them today to Horton to a tea party.

18th. I am here alone for the night. Ann came down yesterday and stayed till after breakfast this morning. John and Rob came down for the evening. I read some of Simeon's letters. I almost thought I could see him. Mrs. Dorman had a daughter yesterday and Marcia Holmes one today; that is the way of the world; some coming into the world and others dropping out. Some are in joy and others in sorrow. I found comfort in reading the scriptures today. The promises are many, the Lord is a stronghold in the day of trouble. I took a walk in my garden this afternoon. Capt. Michener called my attention to my large strawberry plant. I was surprised to see how it had spread and grown. It was a year ago today I set it out, the day when many returned home from sea. Joseph and Asa in the "Wanderer" and Capt. Beckwith with others, but this year brings no good news for me.

19th. My old friend and tutor, Mr. Kirk, called to see me this afternoon. He is a very sympathizing friend. I felt glad to have him talk with me; he was a friend of Simeon's and they had many talks together. Father is here now and wishes me to go home with him and stop for Sunday. I think I will go. My friends are all very kind.

21st. Monday evening finds me alone at my table scribbling. Yesterday was a drizzly day, and a melancholy one. Rev. Vaughan preached a funeral sermon from the text, "Be ye also ready, etc." It seemed as if it was a call to all of us. I felt as though I wished to have the

body before me while the services were being held, but alas! that was denied. There sat his old father, who a year ago listened to the funeral sermon of his wife, Emily Ann, Abigail, Hibbart and Mary and many of my relations were present; his brother John is on the ocean in ignorance of all. The service was very affecting, but I do not mourn without a hope for a re-union at the resurrection morning. Oh, I felt if I could only see his body there to be interred, it would be some solace to me, but perhaps I would feel no better. Rev. Shields gave an address to the Sunday School in the afternoon. Many were there and showed close attention. This afternoon

the "John Wiley" was launched, the last vessel that was launched here. Simeon was in the foretop. Mrs. G. Davidson has been here this afternoon; she is a fine Christian woman. She wishes to sympathize with me in my affliction but all their sympathy can not recall my loved one.

22nd. Fine, clear weather. Elmira came and stayed all night with me. She is truly a good sincere girl. I love to have her pray with me. We arose early and had breakfast, but no sign of daylight yet, it was just moonlight. I am going up home today to stay a while.
