POULTRY AND STOCK

One of the newest features. and also one of the most successful, of this department's work is the attention given to poultry raising. The demand of the province for poultry is very large and hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of poultry and eggs have been yearly imported in the past. The department wants to change this and make the local supply almost meet the demand. Hon. Mr. Finlay has given this matter his most sympathetic supervision an expert has been placed in charge and so excellent was the poultry bulletin published by the latter this year that an American agriculural college has ordered a large number to be used in their classes. Poultry fattening stations are established at various points, thousands of birds are fattened there yearly, and demonstration classes are conducted at all fairs with excellent results.
