

ADMITS BURGLARY IN GRAND FALLS

Youth of Twenty, Who Has Already Served Two Years in Dorchester, Pleads Guilty—Good Work of C. P. R. Detective

Grand Falls, Sept. 24.—Alfred Mignault was arrested Friday by Gordon F. Costello, of the C. P. R. investigation department, St. John, on a charge of breaking and entering the C. P. R. station at Grand Falls on the night of Sept. 15, and also the stores of James Burgess & Sons, Ltd., Thomas Corey and Thomas Mulherin, and the garage of Felix Charette.

Mignault had in his possession when arrested at the home of his grandfather, Fred des Chene, a few miles from here, one suit of clothes and one sweater taken from the store of James Burgess & Sons, Ltd.; one suit of clothes, two suits of underwear, three shirts and one pair of shoes taken from the store of T. Corey, and one storage battery taken from Charette's garage.

He was arraigned before Police Magistrate James P. Kelly, pleaded guilty to the charges, and was remanded for sentence until Tuesday, Sept. 26. Mignault is twenty years of age and has served two years in Dorchester penitentiary for similar offences. He has two brothers now serving terms for similar offences.

The town is greatly indebted to Felix Charette, whose time and automobile were at the service of the C. P. R. investigator, Gordon F. Costello, and the inspector is congratulated by the citizens on the able manner in which he conducted the case. Working without the slightest clue or any facts, he was able to bring to an end the burglaries of the last few weeks in Grand Falls.

CONDITIONS IN AROOSTOOK CO.

The potato situation in Aroostook presents almost any side but a bright one. The yield is small, very small, some fields yielding twenty barrels per acre, others thirty and forty, while some are getting fifty and sixty, and occasionally a yield of 100 barrels is reported, the latter being almost as unusual as a white blackbird, however, this small yield, coupled with the small price, which is under \$1.00 per barrel, reinforced by the accumulation of three years' bills due to reverses, makes a rather serious condition—not a fanciful theory but a stern reality. A large number of farmers will not realize enough from their crop to pay fertilizer bills to say nothing of other expenses. And when we link this lamentable condition with the fact that we, as a county, have already had two years of financial famine, the prospects are certainly discouraging, if not disheartening. The outcome is problematical—no one is able to foretell just what will happen in a financial way. Some have already borrowed their limit, and with impaired credit, one will have to search with a very strong magnifying glass to discover the silver lining within every dark cloud.
