WILLIAMS BEAT McLOUGHLIN. Newport, R. I., Sept. 1—Catching the champion in the doldrums, and playing with a sustained brilliancy, R. N. Williams of Philadelphia today snatched the chief lawn tennis honor of the country from Maurice E. McLoughlin, of San Francisco, who held it for two years. Williams victory was in straight sets, the score being 6-3, 8-6, 10-8. The result was one of the greatest surprises of the year.

London, Sept. 1—The war office has informed the football associations that it is agreeable to a continuance of football. The football leagues have recommended each club to arrange for players undergoing military drill and rifle practice.

PARISIANS DO NOT
FEAR AEROPLANES

Paris, Sept. 2 (2:10 a.m.)—The operations of the German aeroplanes over Paris have been watched with equanimity by the people. The first day the operations caused some nervousness among the women; the second day it was already an old story, and the third day they provoked for the most part scarcely any remarks. A German monoplane dropped a bomb at the Rue Michodiere and the Rue Du Centre near the Credit Lyonnais, this afternoon. A gun mounted on the bank fired four shots at the aeroplane and two English infantrymen fired their rifles repeatedly.

Another bomb was dropped near St. Lazare Station. Neither bombs did any damage.

A squadron of French armored aeroplanes have been ordered to give chase to the German aeroplanes which have been flying over Paris.

AUSTRIAN RESERVISTS

Duluth, Minn., Sept. 1—Three Austrian reservists trying to make their way from Port Arthur, Ont., to Australia, via the United States, were held virtually as prisoners of the war for five hours and then were taken back to Canadian soil on the same boat.

SOCIALIST EDITOR ARRESTED

Amsterdam, Sept. 1—According to the Berlin Socialist paper Vorwaerts the editor of the Volksfreund of Brunswick, has been arrested by the military authorities owing to the publication of articles calculated to inflame public opinion.

Ottawa, Sept. 1—Mr. Charles H. Williams, of the parliamentary press gallery has been appointed in charge of the official press service of the militia department.

Ottawa, Sept. 1—Mr. R. G. McConnell today entered upon his duties as deputy minister of mines, succeeding R. W. Brock.

London, Sept. 1—An Amsterdam despatch to the Central News says the town of Malines was again bombarded for a few minutes today.

London, Sept. 2 (12:29 a.m.)—The correspondent of the Reuter Telegram Company reports that an extensive movement of the German troops toward the north has been begun from Brussels. It is believed the Germans are going to Antwerp where an investment and bombardment are expected.

Warsaw, Ind., Sept. 1—Etna Green, a town 10 miles west of here was burned tonight and 500 residents were made homeless. Lightning set fire to a railway depot, the flames spreading and almost every structure in the hamlet was destroyed, despite a severe rain storm.

London, Sept. 2 (1:15 a.m.)—The correspondent of the Telegraph who has just returned from Brussels brings a report that a young Frenchman who represented the Chicago Daily News in Brussels has been arrested and shot.

OFFICERS WANT TO

GO AS PRIVATES

Ottawa, Sept. 1—Owing to the necessity of retaining a sufficient number of officers in Canada for instructional purposes and to command additional units to be organized in the future, officers now in camp at Valcartier will not be allowed to resign their commands and go with the first overseas contingent as privates as many of them wish to do. At the present time there are at the big camp about one officer for every 25 men, not all of whom, however, are well trained.

It will take about seven hundred officers to command the first contingent, all of whom must be trained. This means that over 1000 officers now in camp will not be allowed to accompany the force, but, as the minister of militia stated, they all are counted upon being given an opportunity to serve the Empire at an early date either in Canada or abroad.

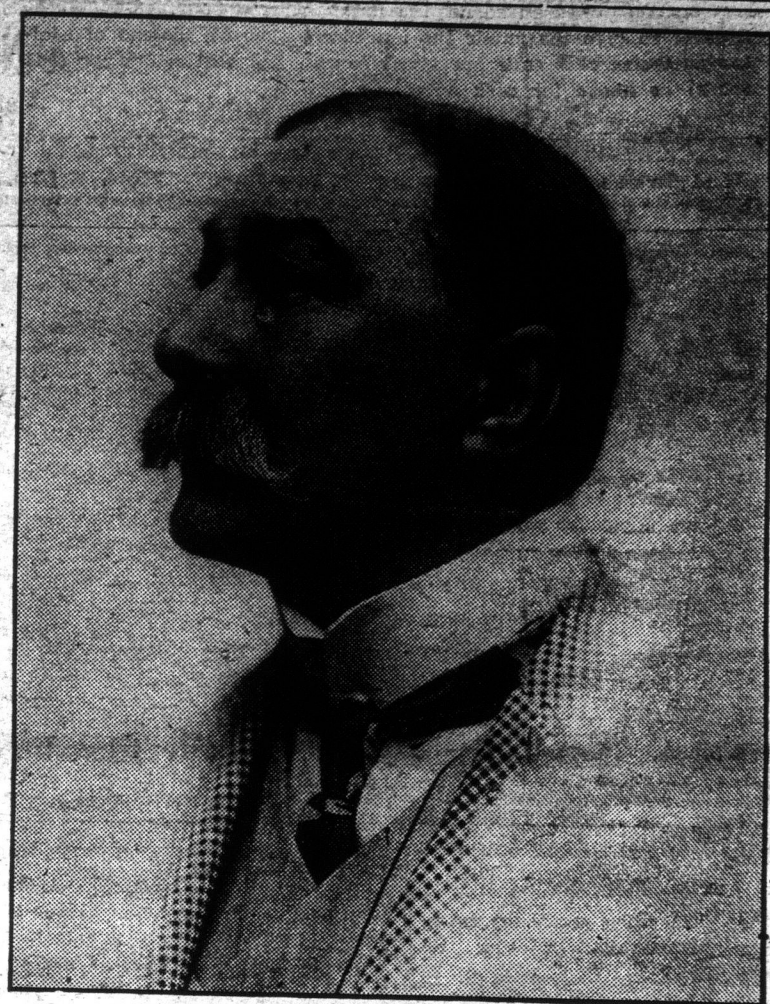
