

SUPREME COURT, PICTOU, N. S.

On Thursday evening the Grand Jury came into Court with a true Bill, for Manslaughter, against the whole of the crew of the Fairy Queen, who were in custody. The delay in finding the bill was owing to the number of witnesses to be examined, and the novel nature of the charge requiring extraordinary care in the drawing of the indictment. The prosecution was intrusted to the Hon. J. W. Johnston, Senior Queen's Counsel, on the circuit. The parties were not arranged in consequence of an objection which, on the following morning, was taken to the indictment by the prisoners' Counsel, on the ground that the Grand Jury list, as well as the panel of Jurors by whom the bill was found, was imperfect in law, not having the places of residence and the calling or occupation of the parties mentioned as required by the statute. A rule nisi was granted for argument in Michaelmas term at Halifax, and the prisoners were ordered to be admitted to bail on giving recognizances as follows:—the Captain, Clerk and Mate each in the sum of £200, with two sureties in the sum of £100 each; the two Engineers in £100 each and two sureties in £50 each; William Mills in £50 and two sureties in £25 each and John Donnelly and William McKenna in their own recognizance of £50 without sureties. The two latter belong to P. E. Island, and they as well as Mills were found to be so little implicated in the blame of this melancholy affair as to be almost guiltless.

The Gas works are now nearly completed, and are being pushed forward with much vigor by the Directors and Mr. Allen their agent. We believe that all the mason work, including the tank, retort house, furnaces, chimney &c., are now finished; the gas holder is also ready, the main pipe is laid through Church and water streets, the service pipes are now being laid down, and the Gas Fitters have been at work for some weeks putting in the necessary fixtures in shops and dwellings. A very few weeks, we think, will suffice to have the works in operation, and the gas burning in most of the houses in water street. It is a pity that no steps have yet been taken to have the streets lighted; but we suppose no person will move in the matter until its importance is forced upon their attention by the dark nights and muddy streets of November and December.

The streets and side walks are now being opened in every direction for laying down service pipes from the main pipe to the houses, and strangers should be cautious in walking or driving through the streets, particularly after night, as many holes have necessarily to be left open from one day to another, presenting dangerous traps and pitfalls, which might cause serious injury to the unwary.—Picton Eastern Chronicle.

The parties who committed the robbery on the Coach between Truro and Pictou, have been discovered. They are two young men of the name of Pratt whose family live near the stage stables at Salmon River. They are both now in jail in Truro. Both the Trunk and Mail bags were found in the wood shaft a mile from Pratt's house. We understand that the contents of the Trunk, excepting a few articles, have been recovered; but the papers in the mail bag were torn and destroyed.

We notice and but barely notice, the comment on the public meeting, respecting the loss of the 'Fairy Queen' as given by Mr. Whelan in the last Royal Gazette. It is one continued falsehood from beginning to end. There was no attempt to prevent Mr. Lord from being heard, on the contrary, he was heard with the utmost attention; there was, it is true, a loud laugh when Mr. Lord stated, that all that the Rev. Dr. Evans said was true, and yet, that the Fairy Queen was a good boat but all that was over in a moment. And Mr. Lord candidly stated that the Resolutions were moderate, very moderate, much milder than he expected. With regard to the words made use of by Mr. Whelan, we will not say, whether the word 'colleagues,' might not have been the word used, instead of members of the Government; but we do positively deny that the word, 'perhaps' or any thing equivalent to it, was made use of by Mr. Whelan. Far from being made in a mild manner and tone, it was the very reverse, so much so, that the writer has been told by several persons who take no party politics, that had the same thing occurred in many other places, Mr. Whelan would have been roughly handled. After the assertion made by Mr. Whelan that the tender of Mr. Whitney was sent in time, an assertion contradicted by the Hon. Geo. Coles, who, in this respect at least, gives the true version of the affair, who can place the least confidence in what he—Whelan—says? In the case of the qualification for a seat in the Legislature, we expressed at the time our conviction, that the unfortunate man, though he had unquestionably sworn to that which was false, had done so through his ignorance of the nature of the oath; those repeated instances of want of veracity, and principle, would incline us however to put a rather severe construction on his conduct, and we fear entitled it to the term given to it by our contemporary the Islander. And yet, this man's name is inserted in the commission of the Peace, so that he may become 'a terror unto evil doers, and the praise of them that do well.' If it were not, for the great injury done, not only to the administration of Justice, but to the morals of the community, by such injudicious appointments, we could hardly laugh, at the absurdity of the idea.

We must not be understood as in the slightest degree aiming to convey any censure upon his Excellency the Lieut. Governor, who, we doubt not, has in this case, been induced to make the appointment not of his own mere motion but by the advice of those who are called, but alas! are not his constitutional advisers.

MICMAC MISSION.

A public meeting was held in the Baptist Chapel, Charlottetown, on Monday evening, 24 inst., Com. Orsaker in the chair. The house was crowded to overflowing. The Chairman briefly explained the object of the meeting. Four years ago a Mission, embracing all the evangelical denominations in these Provinces, had been commenced, with a view to the amelioration of the condition of the Indians. Mr. Rand, who had already made some proficiency in the language, was employed to labor among them. A portion of the Scriptures—the gospel of Matthew—has now been published in Micmac, and to some extent has been circulated among them. A school and an industrial establishment is now to be commenced in Nova Scotia, and for that purpose Mr. Rand is about going there with his family. This meeting

has been called for the purpose of hearing his statements relative to these objects, and to his labors during the past summer, and to bid him an affectionate farewell.

Rev. D. Fitzgerald read a portion of scripture, and Rev. Dr. Evans prayed. The chairman then called upon Mr. Rand, who gave a detailed account of his labors among the Indians during the summer. He had been in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as well as in this Island. He had received somewhat rough treatment in a few instances, but in general had been received with kindness by the Indians. As a proof of their confidence, Mr. Rand laid before the meeting a Petition to the Queen, which he had been employed to draw up by a number of Micmac Chiefs. This document was listened to by the meeting with the most profound attention; it sets forth according to the Indian's own ideas of it, the treatment which they have sustained at the hands of the white man. They complain of wrongs sustained, of violated treaties, of neglect, oppression, and outrage. These complaints, are, alas, too well founded. They ask for justice, and justice should be granted them. The Petition will probably be referred back to the colonial legislature, and must receive some consideration; whatever results may be obtained. The Petition will hereafter be published, so that an investigation of its truth can be entered into. Mr. Rand also read a paper to the meeting, signed by a number of heads of Indian families, expressive of their desire to be instructed in the arts and sciences, and that their children should be taught to read the word of God, and stating that they would thankfully embrace the offer of stated employment, a permanent abode, and school for their children. Such an establishment is to be forthwith commenced at Hantsport, anew and thriving village near Windsor, Nova Scotia. This place combines many advantages for such an institution. The Indians are attached to the spot. There was once an Indian town there, and through the groves of their fathers have been descended, by the ploughshare of civilization, they still cherish naturally enough a fondness for the spots where their forefathers lived and roamed, the lords of the soil. It is now the seat of a protestant community, there being scarcely any Roman Catholics in the place. Then too to facilitate the sale of the Indian manufactures, ready access is had to St. John, N. B. and the United States by water on the one hand, and to Halifax by land on the other. It is intended to take their work at a fair compensation, to encourage them in this way to industry, and to induce them to shun their migratory habits. Several pupils merchants have engaged to take charge of the mercantile department—and the Society will make up to them any loss which may be sustained.

The meeting was briefly addressed by Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, and Lieut. Hancock, R. N. expressing their cordial concurrence in the objects of the mission. The latter gentleman appealed to any R. C. who might happen to be present, whether the dark and degraded state of the Micmac tribe so long under the instruction of their church, did not fully justify the efforts now making by this mission, to educate and raise them in the state of social life and whether such efforts should be met with any feelings on their part.—He then said he believed the feelings of all who had the privilege of Mr. Rand's acquaintance was on the one hand regret that the very success of their missionary's efforts rendered it necessary for him to remove from this Island, and on the other, that from their long acquaintance with him, they had the fullest confidence in his qualifications for the self-denying work to which they believed the Providence of God had called him, and whilst in the name of the meeting he wished him God speed, he would hope, that he would be remembered and followed whilst in midat the of his Indian family by the prayers of those whom he left behind.

A collection was taken amounting to three pounds nine shillings.—Com.

By a letter which arrived last evening, we learn that the Steamer Commodore, plying between the Bend of Pictou and the city of St. John, N. B. is reported to have sunk in the Bay Fundy. The Commodore was a sister Steamer to the unfortunate 'Fairy Queen.'
