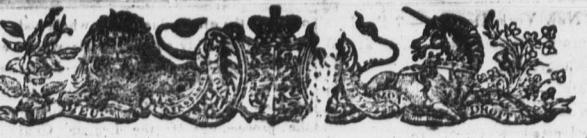

BY-LAWS

Of the Municipal Council of the District of Huron, Passed at a
Special Meeting of the said Council, held at Goderich on the
2nd, 5th and 6th days of October, 1849, in compliance with
the Act 12 Victoria, chapter 81.

WILLIAM CHALK, ESQ., WARDEN.

CHAPTER I.

BY-LAW for carrying out certain Provisions of the Act 12 Vic-
toria, chapter 81, preparatory to the first Elections to be held
under the said Act.

Whereas in accordance with certain requirements under the
Act 12 Victoria, chapter 81, a Special Meeting of the Municipal
Council was held on the 2nd, 5th and 6th days of October,
1849, for carrying out the intentions of certain clauses therein:
Be it enacted by the Warden and Municipal Council of the Dis-
trict of Huron in Special Meeting assembled, in pursuance of
the powers vested in them by the said Act 12 Victoria, chap-
ter 81, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,
that the following Townships be and are hereby declared to be
attached to each other, viz.:

The Township of Holland to be attached to the Township of
McKean.

The Township of Wawanosh to be attached to the Town-
ship of Ashfield.

The Township of Stephen to be attached to the Township of
Urburne.

The Township of Marlborough to be attached to the Town-
ship of Elice.

The Townships of Elms and Wallace to be attached to the
Township of Logan.

And all the Townships comprising the intended or Junior
County of Bruce to be attached to the Township of Ashfield.

2nd. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,
that, Whereas by the said Act 12 Victoria, chapter 81, the
Town of Goderich is set apart from the Township of Goderich,
and divided into four Wards for the purposes therein mention-
ed, the following parties of voters are hereby declared to be Re-
turning Officers for the respective Wards in the said Town of
Goderich, set opposite their names, viz.:

William Robertson, Esquire, for St. George's Ward.
Alphus F. Morgan, Esquire, for St. Patrick's Ward.
George Fraser, Esquire, for St. Andrew's Ward.
Joseph Williamson, Esquire, for St. David's Ward.

3rd. And it is further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that
the place for the holding of the First Township Meeting under
the said Act 12 Victoria, chapter 81, for the Township of
Goderich, be held at the School House in the Township of
Holland, commencing on the 1st day of November next.

4th. And it is further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that
the Township of Down to be divided and is hereby declared to
be divided into five Rural Wards, as follows, viz.:

Ward No. 1, to consist of that part of the Township lying east
of Lots 1 and 2, from the 1st to the 8th Concession.

Ward No. 2, to consist of Lots 3 to 13, from 1st to 8th Con-
cession inclusive.

Ward No. 3, to consist of Lots 14 to 25, from 1st to 8th
Concession inclusive.

Ward No. 4, to consist of all that part of the Township lying east
of the line between 5 and 6, and south of the 8th Con-
cession.

Ward No. 5, to consist of all that part of the Township lying west
of the line between 5 and 6, and south of the 8th Con-
cession.

5th. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,
that the following places be and are hereby declared to be the
places for holding the Elections in the different Wards in the
Township of Down, viz.:

Ward No. 1, the School House in Stratford.
Ward No. 2, William Byres, Lot 11, in the 5th Concession.
Ward No. 3, James Bellard.
Ward No. 4, William Clive.
Ward No. 5, David Muir.

CHAPTER II.

BY-LAW providing an allowance of 6s. 3d. per diem to Dis-
trict Councilors for every day they actually sit in Special
Meeting, under the Act 12 Victoria, chapter 81, and the Act
12 Victoria, chapter 8.

Whereas by the powers vested in Municipal Councils, be it
enacted by the Warden and Municipal Council of the District
of Huron, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,
that the Warden be sign orders on the Treasurer for the sum
of 6s. 3d. per day in favor of each Councilor for each day he
may have sat in Special Council for carrying out the provisions
of the Act 12 Victoria, chapter 81, and also the Act 12 Vic-
toria, chapter 8, and that to be independent of any wages they
may be entitled to on account of their attending to their duties
at the ordinary Session of Council.

FURTHER NEWS BY THE EUROPEAN.

IRELAND.
On the 1st November there were 759
persons in the goals of Ireland committed
as dangerous lunatics.

The *Liner Examiner* says, "There is
a lady at present an inmate of the work-
house here whose husband was High Sher-
iff of this County a few years back."

The *Neary Telegraph* has an account
of the eviction of fifteen families in Mil-
town, in the vicinity of Lough Neagh. It
is stated that the evicted parties were very
poor, utterly unable to pay rent or till the
land; and that the estate from which they
were ejected is in Chancery.

ENGLAND.
HUNGARIAN EMIGRANTS TO THE UNITED
STATES.—The United States Mail Steamer
Hermann, Capt. G. Crabtree, Arrived at
Southampton on Sunday, the 19th Novem-
ber, from Bremen, en route to the North
Sea.

The *Hermann* had about 80 passengers from
Bremen to New York, among whom are
some Hungarian Celebrities.—One of these
is Tullius Jagella, ex-Gov. of the
Portress of Comorn, who proceeds to
the United States, intending to form a
Hungarian Colony. He has letters of
introduction to Gen. Taylor, President of
the Republic, to Hon. Mr. Bancroft, and
other men of distinction in America. He
is accompanied by his two sons and two
daughters; and by several Hungarian offi-
cers, who appeared on the deck of the *Her-*
manna, dressed in the picturesque military
costume of Hungary. Ladislas Ujzethy, is
an aged and venerable looking man, with a
flowing and grey beard and mustache, and
wearing a semi-oriental dress.

Another extraordinary Hungarian on
board this steamer is Madolesicello Apolonia
Jagella who has the rank of Lieuten-
ant in a regiment of cavalry during the
Hungarian war, and was subsequently Ad-
jutant of the army in the fort of Comorn
during the time that city held out against
the Austrians. Madolesicello Jagella is re-
presented to have been present in several
engagements during the Hungarian insur-
rection, and to have fought with much gal-
lantry. She proved herself a great adept
in street fighting, and boasts of having
slain a fair number of Austrian soldiers.—
In appearance Madolesicello Jagella is far
from repulsive, her features bearing a plea-
sant but determined expression.

It may be satisfactory for the reader to
know that this lady is now under engage-
ment to be married to a young Hungarian
officer, immediately on arrival at New York.

Mrs. Gordon on Austrian Affairs.

The *Cologne Gazette* publishes the fol-
lowing letter addressed by Mr. Golden to
the Austrian Minister of the Interior, Herr
Rath, and dated London, 20th October,
1849:—Sir:—These lines are not addressed
to you in your character as a member of
the Austrian Government; they are address-
ed to you personally, as a gentleman, whose
liberal and enlightened views I had the
pleasure to meet when I had the
pleasure to make your acquaintance in Vi-
enna. As a patriot for this step you will
find in the principles of humanity and civil-
ization which at that time were equally
cherished by us both. Mindful, then, of
the opinion which recommended me to your
friendly attention in the year 1847, I feel not
surprised that you are now less favorably in-
clined toward them than you were then.

"Public opinion in my country is horizon-
struck at the call-blooded enemies which
have been exercised in the fallen leaders of
the Hungarians. The feeling is not con-
fined to one particular party, for there is
not a man in all England who has defend-
