

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Doninion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry

must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or inspec

tion made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Subagent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to omplete the transaction are received by mail. In case of "personation" the entry

will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of An application for inspection must

be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of. A homesteader whose entry is in good standing, and not liable to canellation, may, subject to approval of

of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of Where an entry is summarily canelled, or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of concellation proceedings, the applicant for inspec-tion will be entitled to prior right of

Applicants for inspection must state in what particulars the homecteader is in default, and if subsequently the statement is found to be ncorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of entry, should the land vacant, or if entry has been granted may be summarily cancelled. Duties .- A settler is required to riorm the conditions under one of he following plans:-

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three (2) If the father (or mother, if the ather is deceased) of a homesteader

Quartz.-A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered nineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500 x 1,500 feet. The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the

tocator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase one land at \$1 per acre. The patent provides for the paynent of a royalty of 2 12 per cent. on he sale Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

An applicant may obtain two leases

o dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2 1-2 per cent. collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
