St. Louis dispatch says:—The Executive Board of the District Assemblies, 101, 17 and 93, K. of L. has issued an address to the K. of L. and trades unions throughout North America intended as a reply to statements made by Mr. Jay Gould in regard to the strike of the railroad emplayer of the Southward Mr. Jay Gould in regard to the strike of the railroad employes of the Southwest. After quoting from the statements of Mr. Gould a sentence saying that the employes upon his roads have presented no grievances to their management, the address says:—"We have wearied the press and worn the types of the world in stating grievances and demanding an opportunity to present them to Gould and his lieutenants. We have offered, through the highest channels that represent us in the nation, to meet him upon any field. We have pleaded and demanded that we be heard. To all this Gould has turned a derf ear, and now, before the world, we challenge him to hear our complaints.
