Turkey Yields Tripoli.

city that Italy had declared war against Turkey, and intelligence of actual hostilities were awaited. The loss of a destroyer by Turkey is reported. Whether it was attended by bloodshed or loss of life is not reported. The war in Tripoli itself seems to have pursued its way to an early close quite peacefully, re-lieved only by a bit of dramatic staging. If the London Chronicle's Constantinople despatch is trustworthy, the war is practically over the Sultan of Turkey having yielded Tripoli to force, This report seems not unreasonable. Turkey in all probability has a much more efficient and powerful army than Italy possesses.

If the success of the two armies within the last sixteen years affords a criterion. At Adowa the Italians suf-fered a decisive defeat and the whole Abyssinian campaign proved a fiasco. hand, the ease with which Turkey disposed of Greece in 1897 showed that her army had profited by its reorganization under German officers But Turkey cannot strike Italy ex cept over the sea, nor can she pu up a fight worth while in Tripol without transporting her European troops across the sea which divide. Tripoli from Turkey. She can attempt neither of these necessities. Her sea power is a negligible quantity, while on the other hand Italy is one of the sea powers of the world and possesses and can maintain com which possesses probably not a sin-gle formidable modern battleship. Garrison Called Upon to Surrender

Special to Evening Felegram. TRIPOLI, To-day. The Italian squadron cruising in the offing, came close in shore this morning and the destroyer Garibaldino steamed into the harbor at noon, flying the white flag. An officer landed in a boat. Turkish soldiers surround-ed the pier. The officer asked for the Turkish commander. When taken to him he formally announced that the Italian fleet had been ordered to occupy the town. He demanded the instant surrender of the whole Turkish garrson. The Turkish command er replied that he was unable to com ply with the demand and emphati-cally refused to surrender. The in-cident was witnessed by the foreign residents who gathered round the talian officer and cheered him enthusiastically. The boat then return ed to the destroyer which rejoined the fleet. A number of residents of Tri-poli spent the night, camped on the beach, alarmed at the possibility that the Arabs would get out of hand and begin pillaging. Arabs are constantarriving from the country. Mosques are kept open, and through-out the night were filled with praying Arabs.




