Licensing Board Met Yesterday.

At 4 p.m. yesterday the Licensing Board met at the Court House when the applications for renewal of licenses from T. J. Alan and Mrs. Mary Connors were considered.

Mr. Allan was represented by Mr. W. J. Higgins, and Mrs. Connors by D. J. Greene, K.C. The Temperance side was represented by Revs. J. Bell and J. W. Bartlett, who set forth their opposition to the granting of these licenses at some length, contending that the Board had power to refuse them, and considering the court records in their hearing on these, they thought the Board should accede to their request.

Mr. Greene was heard for Mrs. Connors and Mr. Higgins claimed that the breaches of the law committed by his client were purely technical, and for the more serious ones he had been fined and punished. He contended that the Board should not supersede the power vested in the Magistrate.

Both licenses will be renewed. E. Collins, who will retire from the business, will be given until December 24th to dispose of his stock. Garrett Brownrigg also had his license renewed, he having an interest in the business with his lately deceased father.

Greeted by Another Big House.

The second drama in the repertoire of the popular Klark-Urban Co. was staged by them last night and was greeted by another overflow audience in the T. A. Theatre. The piece presented was Channing Pollock's dramatization of "In the Bishop's Carriage," and the excellent handling it received left no doubt on the minds of St. John's theatre-goers that they have among them an aggregation of the most talented actors and actresses. The plot is one which is full of human interest, and in certain periods appeals very much to the emotions. The story has reference to a type of female outcast and thief who is reformed and led to lead an honourable existence by the influence of a good man who falls in love with her and whose affection is reciprocated. Massie Cecil performed the part of the heroine Nan in her usual finished and expressive style, and received the lion's share of the applause which the audience unstintingly gave throughout the performance. Hardon Klark, the lawyer, who reforms Nan, was simply inimitable in this role; while Fred Schreiber, as Tom Dragon, thief and convict, displayed his versatility and handled this role in a very clever manner. Frank Urban, as Ramsey, the wealthy sport, kept the house laughing heartily at his every appearance; and Messrs. Hodgkins, Leith and Hunt impersonated important characters to the piece with much credit to themselves and pleasure to the audience. The other gentlemen who had more or less minor roles to deal with departed themselves admirably. The specialties were more than ordinarily interesting. Billy Webb's clever dancing and comical gestures "brought down the house," and he had to respond to several encores. Klark, Urban and Schreiber gave some splendid musical selections. THE UNIVERSE HAS PUBLISHED, BY THE UNIVERSITY

Encyclopaedia

28 years since the last entirely new edition.

HITHERTO, new editions of the Encyclopaedia Britannica have appeared on an average, of 14 years.

The first seven editions (1768-1898) were separated from one another by periods of 12 years; but, as the labour and preparation increased, with the vast amount of special studies, the interval longer. 21 years separated the 7th (1830-'42) from the 8th (1853-'60), the 8th from the 9th (1875-'89). It will be seen that 28 years separate a new edition which has just been completed.

The 9th and 10th editions.

The lapse, on this occasion, of period is due to the extension of life to the 9th edition by "The Times" in 1902, issued a supplement sufficient to entitle the enlarged work to the description of the 10th edition. A number of copies had been sold of the 9th which contained articles of great value.

Such an extension of life, therefore, seemed doubly desirable. Important as were the additions thus made, the issue of supplementary volumes was recognized to be but a temporary measure.

When the first volume of the 9th edition appeared (1875) a German Empire under the leadership of Prussia, a united Italy with its capital in Rome, a Japanese empire centralised under the sovereignty of the Mikado, were institutions only four years old.

The first 12 volumes had appeared by 1881. The British occupation of Egypt had not begun; the subject of bacteriology had not sufficiently advanced to be referred to in the book; gold had not yet been discovered in the Transvaal; no public electric supply station had yet been built in London. The series of 24 volumes was completed by 1889. The Trans-Siberian railway had not been begun; in surgery, the carbolic spray had not yet yielded to the use of sterilized instruments; of the first-class battleships and cruisers constructed at the time when the article "Ship" was written, none are now in commission, save for instructional purposes.

Some years were still to pass before the discovery of the X Rays, before the appearance of motor cars, electric traction, steam turbines, and aeroplanes.

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The Need for an entirely new edition.

It was evident that, while a few volumes might make good many created by the lapse of time, the edition of 1875-89, thus supplemented after an interval of twenty years, could not claim the duration of a new edition. No such of "bringing up to date," nor any such merging of the supplementary articles those in the 9th edition, could thorough new a book of which the contents were beginning to reflect the point of view of a new generation.

An entirely new edition founded, that is to say, upon a fresh survey of the world—was evidently needed, a year 1910 was mentioned as a probable date for its appearance. The 11th edition is to be compared with the 9th, to which it succeeds as the next entirely new edition.

The new and improved edition.

Now, the Encyclopaedia Britannica appears upon another period of its history with issue of a new edition which is worthy to percede the 9th. If in the distinction of individual contributors the 9th edition standard not to be surpassed, the new edition keeping pace with the increase of studies during the past thirty years, claim to have brought to a fuller development.

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
