When Mr. Parker Mason, a shrewd and levelheaded American millionaire. was on the point of dying a few years having a rehearsal of his own funera ervice in his bedroom. He called in the Rev. John Hoke, a Presbyterian minister, and a few members of the church choir, and the full service was rehearsed in his presence and that of family and a number of his friends.

The clergyman preached an eloquent and touching sermon on the virtnes and charities of the dving man

At the conclusion of the service warmly complimented both clergyman and choir on their performance; and after dismissing them sent for an undertaker and made the necessary arrangements with him and had a pecronal interview with the nall-hearers He died ten hours later, and was buried with the same service to which us had listened when alive.

Mr. Evan P. Jones, of the Methodist Episcopal Home for the Aged, in Philadelphia, spent the last weeks of his life in making his own coffin, whistling cheerfully over the gruesome task, and taking a very evident pride

The design of the coffin had, he said been disclosed to him in a dream. It was of two kinds of wood, with fantastic designs exquisitely carved on the sides and ends, while the lid was a beautiful mosaic of different coloured woods. A week after the completion of his work the old man died, and was buried in the casket he had so beautifully made.

The widow of Herr Stibal, an Austrian millionaffe, spent a large fortune and years of wark on the coffin n which she intended to be interred.

Arranged for Funeral Flowers. The coffin was of oak, with a lining of pure gold, and the outside was decorated with a series of exquisitely painted panels, illustrating the chief ncidents in her life from childhood to old age. The shroud was worked with her own hands in patterns of coloured silks, with infinite skill and almost nicroscopic minuteness, the task occupying her five years; and the pillow on which her head was to rest was lecorated with hundreds of costly

The strange irony of it all was that the old lady actually died when regone to see a dying son, and buried at sea.

A short time ago, Mrs. Katherine Ault, a widow, of Galveston, took a large quantity of beautiful flowers to the Christian Church, of which she was a member, and arranged them artistically around the pulpit for her own funeral. She placed a stand for the coffin, and decorated it with chrysanthemums, and then made all the arrangements for her funeral. On the same night she retired to bed in apparently excellent health, and never woke again.

Mrs. Norton, a wealthy old lady of New York, was, in accordance with her own wish, buried in the armchair in which she had sat during so many invalid years; and Mrs. Marriage, of Sorrel's Farm, near Broomfield, left nstructions that she should be interred in the middle of a ploughed field. where her grave may be seen to-day. with this epitaph: "Ruth, widow of William Marriage, who died on this farm in 1772, and was buried here at her own request."—Pearson's Weekly.
