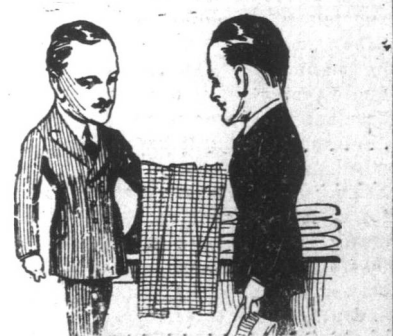

Forty-Five Years in the Service of
the Public—The Evening Telegram.

Phaff Will Seek Redress in Court

New York, Nov. 22.—Max Phaff,
New York lawyer, who recently spent
some time in jail at Brest, France,
and some days in court on trial on
charges of rum piracy, returned
home on the steamship President
Harding yesterday. He announced he
would file an action for damages
against the French owners of the pi-
rated liquor, which was aboard the
French steamer Mulhous. It was
they, he said, who had caused his de-
tention and trial.

Phaff, now at liberty on 5,000 francs
bail pending further action, asserted
that his trial had been irregular, that
newspaper men had been barred from
what he termed the "star chamber
sessions" and that garbled reports
of the proceedings had been given out
by French officials. Finally, he said,
he was released on small bail and
handed a passport in an obvious ef-
fort to put an end to the proceed-
ings.

Phaff said it was his belief that the
Paris firm of Maur Francise, owners
of the pirated liquor, had caused his
arrest in the hope that those really
responsible for the crime would come
forward to exonerate him and thus
incriminate themselves.

The lawyer was accused of having
aided the hi-jackers who raided the
Mulhouse off the New Jersey coast
last July 24, when her cargo of liquor
and all money in her safe were stolen.
Two employees of Maur Fran-
cise who had travelled with him
from London to Paris made affidavit
that he had drunkenly boasted to them
that he had participated in the raid.
Phaff asserted that he had never drank
in his life and denied that he had dis-
cussed rum-running with his French
companions. He asserted that the
Brest authorities refused to let him
produce witnesses who would have
given him a perfect alibi and that he
was not permitted to see his attor-
neys.

Expert Counterfeiter Sent to Jail

FORMER ROYAL ARTIST.

Berlin, Nov. 22.—One of the most
startling cases in the history of coun-
terfeiting had its conclusion here yes-
terday when a Berlin court sentenced
Ivan Missosoyeff, Russian artist and
former favorite of Russian Royalty
and his young sweetheart, Malvinana
Bernick, to three years and six
months in prison for manufacturing
and distributing British pound and
American dollar notes.

With the aid of a band of other
counterfeiters, composed of former
Russian officers, Missosoyeff and his
pretty Italian accomplice circulated
counterfeit currency throughout Eu-
rope, disposing of a total of \$30,000,
but according to the evidence, very
little American money was put into
circulation.

Their counterfeit British notes were
so perfect that the Reichsbank ex-
perts had to send them to the Bank
of England to confirm its suspicion.
Missosoyeff was formerly a member
of the Imperial Russian Academy of
Fine Arts, and many of his works
were bought by the Czar's family.

Last of the Lotteries

Ninety-eight years ago the last
English State lottery was drawn.

The State lotteries were partici-
pated in by all classes of people, and
were held at intervals for all sorts of
objects. Westminster Bridge owes its
existence to one such lottery. The
British Museum to another.

Usually the drawing, which took
place in public, was performed by a
boy chosen by lot from amongst the
scholars of the Bluecoat School, who
received for his trouble the sum of
one guinea.

The coin was solemnly handed to
him on a small silver salver by the
senior presiding officer.

Sometimes however the proceed-
ings were varied by getting a little
girl, brought in at haphazard from
the street, to draw the numbers; and
at one lottery, held in 1683 for the
disposal of Prince Rupert's jewels,
King Charles II. himself took the
leading part.

The novelty of a king presiding
over a "lottery wheel" drew crowds
of investors to the Banqueting Cham-
ber at Whitehall, where the ceremony
took place. The first prize was a
pearl necklace valued at £8,000, won
by a poor washerwoman.
