James Thomas Brudenell, seventh Earl of Cardigan, who led the celebrated charge of the Six Hundred at Balaklava, and whose name has been prominently before the public in more or less honorable connections throughout most of his career, died at his seat in Northamptonshire, England, on the 28th of March, in consequence of a fall from his horse. He was born in 1797, and entered the army at the somewhat mature age of 27, purchasing a cornetcy in the 7th Hussars. The influence of wealthy and family position in the military career in England was strikingly exemplified in his case, for in four years, without having seen a

Fartle east he saw a man on the walk, probably a about twenty yards behind the man at the door, whom we must suppose was Mr. McGee, within a few paces of him and fired. Lacroix further says that though he did not see the features of the murderer, he noticed that the coat worn by that man was dark.
