The ban on the use of sugar for naking french pastry, iced cakes, or biscuits or candy for private con-sumption, as well as in the manu-facture of icing sugar, has been renoved in Canada. The war-time restrictions on the method of serving sugar in public eating places is withdrawn on and after January 1, while granulated sugar may be used in making bread, etc., so, too, the restric-tions on the use of sugar in the manufacture of canned goods, biscuits, cake, dough, products, candies, chocplate, table syrups and the like hamaceutical and medical preparaions, beers and soft drinks, dessert nd jelly powders, ice cream, and ven on chewing gum will not be in orce. For the manufacturer, sugar nay be purchased without the reguar permit, but it must be noted that he restrictions in public eating laces on the use of beef, butter and ats, and for the use of all animal ats by manufacturers still remain in orce. The cancellation of so many ules which war had imposed on anadian use of sugar has been made ossible through unexpected rovement in stocks. - ----




