week's issue of the death of Mrs. Rebecca Hutchison, which occurred on June 13th tains, dress goods, and staple cottons. The ast at her home, south of town, in her 96th stock is being rapidly reduced and while year. The funeral services were conducted at the house on Friday last by the Rev. J. W. J. Andrew, rector of Trinity church, of which deceased had been a faithful member for a great many years. Her maiden name was Fairchilds, and she was born in the township of Charlotteville, Norfolk Co, Nov. 1st, 1804. In 1820 she married David Hutchison, with whom she lived happily until 1865 when he died, and since then she has lived with her sons. Oa the 17th of March, 1822, she moved with her bashind up on Talbot street, a few miles east of Aylmer, riding most of the distance or horseback. They purchased 200 acres of land from the government through Con. Talbot, three acres only of which were Schneider, of this place, was engaged to cleared. They resided there for nearly 50 bore for water on the farm, and at a depth years, and raised a family of five boys and e girl, four of whom are still living, viz William, of New York; Noah, of Manitoba, and A. P. and Lewis, of Malahide. Mrs. Hutchison knew the early history of this section from the earliest date, and remembered many events, which to the present generation, is history. She remembered when McCarty's army marched through the country in the war of 1812. They hid their cattle and many other valuable things in the woods until they had passed. Among other things hidden in an old hollow log was half a barrel of salt, which cost them \$30. The barrel cost \$60 in Hamilton and was teamed home and divided much more carefully between two neighbors than we would now divide a barrel of sugar. Mrs. Hutchison's mother had some bread bak ing in the oven when the soldiers arrived, and they shoved their bayonets into the loaves and pulled them out and ate them. Her father took part in the battle of Lundy's Lane and the "foot race" at Mal comb's hill. She remembered seeing her uncle carrying Ben Chandler on his horse after he was shot. She had been married for 17 years at the time of the rebellion and remembered many incidents. ride to St. Thomas on horseback, with butter and eggs, and more than once she rode back to Norfolk with a child in her arms and returne d with a bag of flour, buckwheat or other provision. She used to like to tell an amusing story of a trip she was once taking to market on horseback, with a big basket of eggs. The horse got scared quick that she sat flat in the middle of the road with the basket of eggs in her lap and never broke an egg. Her long and eventful life ended peacefully, the clock simply run down and the machinery quit working. As a neighbor and friend no one could have
