GIANTS OF THE DEEP.

Enormous Sturgeon Caught in Salmon

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 18.—The fact that ten large sturgeon have recently been taken without hooks, at one drift, with a strong salmon net, is likely to revolutionize the Provincial river fishery. Three of the fish thus taken were exceptionally heavy, weighing over a quarter of a ton each, and the entire ten aggregated at least one and a half tons. These fish were caught without injury to the nets. Similar catches are also reported. A sturgeon weighing over 8:0 pounds, was taken the other day near the Stevenson canneries.


