FAIR AND COOL—SHOWERS IN SOME PLACES.

Toronto, Ont., July 11—11 p.m.—The shallow low area, which for some days was mentioned as being west of the lake region, has, during the past day, developed considerably and moved to the St. Lawrence valley, and the cool wave, which was retarded by the hovering of the low area, has spread over Ontario. Thunder storms have occurred both in Ontario and Quebec. Another pronounced heat wave has appeared in British Columbia, and is spreading across the territories.

In the Dining-Room.

TUESDAY, JULY 13.

BREAKFAST—Bananas with currant juice. Hashed veal with sprig of egg. Avana gams. Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Slices sandwiches. Cucumbers. French dressing. Savory cakes. Frothed chocolate.

DINNER—Green-corn soup. Plank steak broiled. Mashed potatoes. Tomato farci. Raspberry foam. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Bananas with Currant Juice—Cut the bananas an inch thick, place on a dish and sprinkle over sugar, one tablespoon to four bananas; then add the juice of a cupful of currants. Prepare the night before and set in a cool place.

Hashed Veal—Chop fine cold roast veal, or veal cooked in any style will do. Moisten with two tablespoons of veal gravy or water. When hot break into it four eggs. If you have a cupful of veal, if not half a cup of fine state bread crumbs will answer nicely to make the quantity, add a large spoonful of salt. Stir the eggs until cooked and a tablespoonful of butter and a teaspoonful of chopped parsley if liked. Serve quickly.

Avana Gams—Take one and one-half cups of cold cooked "avana." Season with a half-teaspoon of salt (if none was used in cooking), add two-thirds cup of milk (part cream is better) and white flour to make quite a stiff batter. Beat well, drop in hot gem pans, bake quickly. They are light, tender, sweet and very palatable.

Sweet Sandwiches—Mix equal parts of grated Swiss cheese and chopped English walnut meat. Season slightly with salt and cayenne. Spread between thin slices of bread, slightly buttered, and cut in fancy shapes.

Savory Cakes—Beat together for twenty minutes the yolks of six eggs and one-half pound of powdered sugar. When light and thick add one-half of a pound of sifted pastry flour, the grated rind and juice of one lemon and four ounces of corn starch. Whip the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth and carefully cut them in. Bake in a quick oven in finger molds that have been buttered, then dusted with flour and sugar.

Tomato Farci—Cut four tomatoes in halves, place them in a frying pan, the open side down, in one-half inch deep of hot fat. Move them about until they are cooked a little tender. Lift them from the pan carefully and place them side by side in a baking-dish and around them two table-spoonfuls of sweet oil, sprinkled with a tablespoonful of chopped onion, one of parsley, a half-teaspoon of salt, half a teaspoonful of pepper and a pinch of cayenne. Bake in hot oven twenty minutes and serve in same dish.

Raspberry Foam—Soak half a package of gelatin in half a cup of cold water until soft; heat to boiling two and one-half cups of red raspberry juice; sweeten to taste and turn over the soaked gelatin. Stir until perfectly frothy and then strain and set the dish in ice water to cool. When cold beat the whites of three eggs to a stiff froth and stir into the thickening gelatin. Beat until the whole is a solid foam stiff enough to retain its shape. Turn into small mold previous to wet with cold water, then pile roughly in a dish. Serve with whipped cream.

The Wild West Show

Buffalo Bill's Troupe Draws Two Large Audiences.

The performance short but satisfactory—Marksmanship and Horsemanship.

Buffalo Bill and his equestrians, or rough riders, as he prefers to call them, did a very good business in London on Saturday. About 2,000 saw the show in the afternoon, and about 6,000 at night. The open air seating arrangement was very acceptable to the spectators, who would have suffered greatly in a closed tent. The performance was satisfactory—so much so that the patrons would have liked more of it. It lasted only an hour and a half, but not a minute was lost.

The most striking and picturesque feature was the opening number, in which the entire troupe galloped into the enclosure. The variety of nationalities and costumes, the glittering accoutrements, and the perfect order, made a splendid and unique spectacle, which was enhanced when Buffalo Bill rode to the front on a beautiful charger. He was warmly received. The parade around the ring, headed by Buffalo Bill, aroused the greatest enthusiasm at both performances.

The rest of the programme consisted chiefly in daring feats of horsemanship by the "rough riders," Mexicans, Indians and German and Irish cavalrymen. The marksmanship of Annie Oakley, Johnnie Baker and Buffalo Bill was decidedly fine. The latter shattered the clay targets while riding at full speed.

The audience recognized old friends in Hassan Ben Ali and his Arabian couriers, who repeated the marvelous performance given at the Western Fair last year.

The show concluded by 9:30, and before midnight the immense effects had disappeared as if by magic, and were stored away on the special train for Chatham.

Orangemen at Church

The Local Lodges, Accompanied by the S. O. E. Attend Divine Service.

Two Hundred Orangemen and Their Friends Listen to an Appropriate Sermon by Rev. J. E. Moorhouse.

The annual church parade of the local Orangemen (district No. 1) took place yesterday afternoon. The day was an excellent one for the occasion—plenty of breeze and no sun. The Orangemen, True Blues, Sons of England and the lady contingent numbered about 200, with the Seventh Band included. The small attendance was probably due to the fact that a large number of Orangemen had left for Port Huron and St. Thomas, where the "Glorious Twelfth" is being celebrated today. The different Orange lodges met at their headquarters, corner of Dundas and Richmond streets, and the Sons of England at their rooms at the corner of Carling and Richmond streets. The procession formed about 4 o'clock, and was composed of the Seventh Band, a delegation from each of the lodges of the Sons of England; Hackett L. O. L., No. 855, Wm. Fox, W. M.; Forest City L. O. L., No. 762, W. Johnston, W. M.; Ashgill L. O. L., No. 230, John Walker, W. M.; Boyne L. O. L., No. 238, Hamilton Ramsay, W. M.; Covenant Precinct, No. 248, Royal Black Knights of Ireland, John McDonald, worthy preceptor; L. O. L. No. 11, True Blues; Juvenile Orangemen and Juvenile Sons of England; the five and drum band and the two lodges of ladies, Victoria L. O. L., No. 2, and Stanley L. O. L., No. 4.

Bros. James McKinn and James Tuffield acted as marshals, and, placing District Worshipful Master, John Shoultice at the head of the procession, they marched to Christ Church by way of Dundas and Wellington streets. The Seventh Band headed the procession, followed by the Sons of England. Then came the five and drum band, the True Blues and Orangemen.

The first few rows of seats had been reserved for the ladies. The body of the church was filled with members of the orders, and the sides well filled with their friends.

Rev. J. H. Moorhouse preached the sermon, and took for his text Psalm 124: "Thou hast given a banner to them that fear thee, that it may be displayed because of the truth. Selah." He said every true soldier and every true patriot was proud of his banner and flag, and when this afternoon they, as representatives of certain organized bodies, unfurled their colors or banners, the members regarded them as symbols dear to their hearts. The symbol by which was established with the expression in the verse and applied it to the Lord Jesus Christ. God gave to the people of this world Jesus Christ as their banner, which was openly unfurled, and around which the forces gathered. A true soldier was proud of his flag, his people, his banner, his country, and the Christian should openly show his colors among profane and unbelievers, drunkards and men of immoral habits and of a profane tongue. No good soldier would be ashamed of his banner in the dust. Each had been sworn to protect it, and why not do the same for the banner of Christ? The speaker, after referring to the obedience incumbent upon the soldier of the cross, spoke of the qualifications of Orangemen, and quoted from the constitution of the Orange order. "Every member must have a firm and steadfast faith in the Saviour of the world, confessing that he is the only mediator between the offender man and the Great Creator."

The fact that a man was found under a flag indicated that he was a follower of a certain organization, or body, or leader. Every banner had some object. That of the Orangemen was Protestantism. What he had to do was to keep his banner, and to keep his banner to fight and cluster round the banner of Christ. It was a noble flag. Intemperance polluted it; profanity discolored it; sloth rotted every banner; pride burned it, and hatred, malice and bitterness rent it into shreds. The speaker referred to the constitution of the order, and said that it might be ever so well framed, but the people and public could not read it. They themselves were the constitution that would be read, and he pleaded with them to live a life befitting the noble order and a constitution that bordered on perfection.

The music of the choir was under the leadership of Mr. James T. Daltrey, who also ably rendered a solo, which was one of the most striking features of the service.

The collection was divided between the church and the Orange Benevolent Association.

Water was in no great favor as a beverage in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. "The Hospitaller" says: "It needed a very bold man to resist the medical testimony of three centuries ago against water-drinking. Few writers can be found to say a good word for it. One or two only are concerned to maintain that 'when begun early it may be pretty freely drunk with impunity,' and they quote the curious instances given by Sir Thomas Elyot in his 'Castle of Health,' 1541, of the Cornish men, 'many of the poorest sort, which never, or very seldom, drink any other drink, but water, and live well until they be of great age.'"

Thomas Elyot, the medical schoolmaster of Manchester fame, confessed in his 'Haven of Health,' 1589, designed for the use of the student, that he knew some who drank cold water at night or fasting in the morning without hurt, and Dr. James Hart, writing about 50 years later, could even claim among some of his acquaintances "some honorable and worshipful ladies who drink little other drink, and yet enjoy more perfect health than most of them who drink of the strongest." The phenomenon was undeniable, but the natural inference was none the less to be resisted. Sir Thomas Elyot himself is very certain, in spite of the Cornish men, that there be in water causes of divers diseases, as of swelling of the spleen and liver. He complains oddly also that it fitteth and swimmeth, and concludes that "to young men, and them that be of hot complexion, it does less harm, and sometimes it profiteth, but to them that are feeble, old and melancholy, it is not convenient." Water is a wholesome cool by itself for an Englishman, was the verdict of Andrew Borde—monk, physician, bishop, ambassador, and writer on sanitation—as the result of a life's experience. "But the most formal indictment against water is that of Venner, who, writing in 1622, ponderously pronounces to dwellers in cold countries it doth very greatly defect their appetites, destroy the natural heat, and overthrow the strength of the stomach, and consequently confounding the concoction is the cause of crudities, fluctuations, and windiness in the body."
