Being Paid by France for Russia's Friendship.

Alliance May Snap Off Short Very Soon.

Duke of Manchester Bankrupt and Must Resign From His Clubs.

BURNED AT SEA.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The British bark Primera, 597 tons (Capt. Semen), which left London May 31 for Cape Cross, and was spoken July 11 near latitude 33 north, longitude 13 west, was burned Aug. 4 near latitude 13 south, longitude 28 west. One boat landed 9 men on Ascension Island. Another, which left the bark with 11 men, is missing. Capt. Semen is dead.

BANKRUPT DUKE.

The Duke of Manchester has been adjudged a bankrupt, entailing his resignation from all of his clubs. The petitions to the bankruptcy court included one from the young nobleman himself, who accepted of a £9,000 widely distributed in unknown hands that his friends, for some time, have strongly urged this radical course.

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS BROKEN OFF.

As a result of the friction between Roumania and Bulgaria, over the latter's delay in complying with the demand of the former for the suppression of the Macedonian revolutionary committee, the Bulgarian diplomatic agent at Bucharest, Dr. D. Theodoroff, has been recalled. According to the Vienna correspondence of the Daily Express, the French ambassador asserts that Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria has threatened to abdicate unless the quarrel with Roumania is amicably settled.

COSTLY FRIENDSHIP.

A dispatch to the Times from Paris says that the French government is now coming to Paris, the French press, on the whole, seems firmly persuaded that it is undertaken with a view of raising another Russian loan in Paris. As evidence of this, the preliminary visit of M. de Witte, the Russian finance minister, who was here recently, is quoted.

La Libre Parole declares that it knows for certain that an attempt was recently made by Russia to raise a large loan in America and failed, and as money is absolutely necessary to the Russian Government at this moment, a determined attempt will be made to raise it in France.

This position is altogether changing the popular attitude with regard to the Franco-Russian alliance, and many papers, representing the most diverse opinions, declare that France is paying far too high a price for her friendship of her northern neighbor.

At the present juncture this attitude of France is important, as, if the Franco-Russian alliance breaks down, the whole face of European politics is changed.

HARRIETSVILLE.

HARRIETSVILLE, Aug. 30.—Mr. Samuel Calhoun passed away at his own home, the family residence, Aug. 22, aged 88 years. The deceased was born in county Camon, Ireland, in 1819. He came to Quebec in 1874. The family comprised five daughters and two sons, Messrs. John and Samuel Calhoun are residents of Alvinston; Mrs. Facey, relict of the late Robert Facey, Harrietsville; Mrs. Wolliver, Brantford; Miss Sarah, Magdalen Island, at home. The funeral services were held in the Methodist Church and conducted by the Rev. Geo. Buggin, of Avon, on Friday afternoon. The auditorium was filled. Messrs. Wm. Abbott, James Eaton, Robert Barr, Frank King, Seth Cline and Nassau Morris were the pall-bearers. The interment took place to the Union cemetery at Dorchester.

Prize in Gold FOR A NAME

What lists shall be used and who may vote at the coming general elections are set forth in the Elections Act, assented to by Lord Minto on July 18, 1900.

Section 60 of that act reads as follows:

Where there is a voter's list each elector shall, subject to the provisions contained in the next following section of this act, be entitled to vote only at the polling station of the polling divisions upon the list of voters for which his name is entered as such voter, and at no other except as otherwise provided by paragraph F of section 5 of the Franchise Act, 1898.

Section 6 relates to Prince Edward Island alone.
