GOLF.

ON THE TORONTO LINKS.

favoured the golfers this afternoon, and afforded them the chance of seeing the most interesting and important exhibition given over any links in Toronto when Champion Harry Vardon, of Scarborough, England, defeated the best ball of George S. Liza and Vere Brown, of the Rosedale Golf Club, by 5 up and 8 to play. In the bye he won by one hole up, making a total of 6 holes upon the States were played, the full course of 18 holes being gone over twice. On the first round Vardon broke the record of 73 strokes, which, until today, was held by Ritchie, the Rosedale professional. Vardon won the course in 72, taking 38 on the way out and 34 on the way back, making an average of four strokes to the hole. The exhibition was witnessed by nearly 400 enthusiasts, including over 100 ladies, dressed in pretty frocks, who followed the players up hill and down dale, over rough ground and through fences, showing the greatest interest in each stroke. CRICKET.

CANADIANS BEATEN.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 22.—The annual cricket match between the United States and Canada ended today in a victory for the United States, but only after a stubborn contest and only two wickets to spare in a full two-day game. Yesterday the Canadians scored 108 in their first inning, and the United States team 119. Today Canada put together 120 in its second inning, making the grand total 228. The United States then went in for their second inning, and lost eight wickets before they obtained the necessary 110 runs to pass the Canadians' total. H. S. Chambers made the top score for the Canadians today, putting together 60 runs. C. C. Morris carried off the honors for United States in both innings, with 85 and 32 respectively.

FOOTBALL.

The Normal School Association football team played a return match on the military grounds on Saturday against the Wolsey Barracks club, but were defeated by a score of 3 to 1. For the military club, Quartermaster-Sergeant Dunlevy, Sergt. Beales, Corp. Evans and Pte. Farnon, were the stars. For the Normal School, Messrs. Houlahan, Potter, Harrison, Cruickshank and Barratt did creditably good work. The Normal School team are greatly improved since their former match, and will undoubtedly make a good showing ere the season ends.

Saturday saw the best practice of the season. The London and St. John's A. C. teams have amalgamated, the St. John's dropping out of the association, and the members of the team turning out with the London Club. By this happy arrangement the local team will be much strengthened as the boys from the north end had a number of good fast forwards who will do much to stiffen up the London line. Hugh Labatt is a promising centre, and is putting in good hard work. The season opens on Saturday next, when London rubs up against Sarnia in the first round for the intermediate championship. The Juniors are scheduled to meet Hamilton in London on the same date, and two fast and hard games may be expected. Between 40 and 50 candidates for the two teams were out on Saturday afternoon, and good hard work was done.

DRINK STATISTICS

How England Compares With Other Countries.

The latest parliamentary return relating to the production and consumption of alcoholic beverages shows that the consumer of alcohol in the United Kingdom contributes a far larger share to the maintenance of the local and foreign trade than any other country. He contributes, in fact, no less than 36 per cent of the total national revenue. The consumer in the United States comes next with 33 per cent, in France he contributes only 19 per cent, and the German 13 per cent.

Spirits contribute most to the revenue of the United Kingdom, as indicated by the fact that 33 per cent of the total revenue is derived from spirits, while in France it is only 6.5 per cent. In the United States it is 13.5 per cent, and in Germany 10.5 per cent. The annual consumption of spirits in the United Kingdom is 2,077 gallons per head. The United Kingdom and Germany come next, with 1,03 and 1,55 gallons per head, while America, the home of the cocktail, only registers 0.92 gallon per head. In the consumption of wine France has no rival. The statistics show 24.64 gallons per head, while in the United Kingdom, Germany and America the percentage is 0.41, 0.77, and 0.23 respectively.

France manufactures at home 80 per cent of the whole of the wine she consumes. The United States produces as much as 85 per cent, at home, Germany 95.5 per cent, and Australia 94.0 per cent. The wine is produced in the colonies, only 1.05 gallons per head is the average consumption for the last three years. Australia seems to be very temperate, the annual beer consumption being only 10.6 gallons per head, and the spirit consumption 0.76. Canada's figures are even more remarkable, the annual consumption per head being only 0.08, 0.6 and 0.65 gallons in beer, wine and spirits, respectively.

BACK FROM SOUTH AFRICA

Fifty Invalided Canadians Reach Quebec.

The Old City Gives Them an Enthusiastic Reception.

Komatipoort Occupied by British Troops Without Opposition—Ten of the Captured Strathconas Released.

Quebec, Sept. 24. — Quebec was called upon yesterday to receive and welcome back to Canadian shores from South Africa 50 gallant sons from different parts of our wide Dominion. As on many other similar occasions, the old city has had the pleasant duty of acting for the nation in welcoming back these heroes. In spite of the weather, which was far from being favorable, a drizzling rain falling all day, the demonstration was such as to make the boys feel that they were home again. Flags and bunting were conspicuous everywhere in the city, specially on all the public buildings. The Quebec wharf and was formed, and the detachment was escorted to the wharf by the R. C. A. and the R. C. R. I., with the state band and the members of the committee, and citizens generally and some carriages, which the detachment was on hand to convey the boys who were lame or too weak to climb up the hill and walk to the citadel.

The men were quartered in the citadel and Major Paves began this morning to pay them off and grant discharges. The detachment was in charge of Lieut. Van Loven, of the Royal Canadian Dragoon Rifles. Lieut. H. Ketchen, formerly of the N. W. M. P., but who has been serving as a Lieutenant in the Strathcona Horse, was with the party. Lieut. Ketchen was wounded in the left side in the surroundings of Heidelberg, and afterwards suffered with an attack of enteric fever. The following Western Ontario men are in the party:
