Tokio, Tuesday, Aug. 14.-A semi- | Tung Chau appears to be about 12 official dispatch from Tung Chow (Tung Chau), dated Aug. 12, says: "The Japanese troops occupied Fung Chow today. We are now ten miles from Pekin. The Chinese seem to have retreated towards Pekin. Last night a quantity of arms and a granary, with great stores of rice, were captured."

SHANGHAI SENDS BAD NEWS. Shanghai, Aug. 15 .- Rinderpest is prevalent among the cattle shipped from Shanghai for Che Foo for the British troops. The shipments have

been stopped. The consuls will meet today. The landing of the British troops is not objected to by the representatives of other nations; but the latter have declared they will adopt the same course. To this the British have objected, and have threatened to withdraw the troops which are now ready to land.
