### GIRL TO SWIM RAPIDS 14.

Miss Beckwith Says She Will Brave Whirlpool Sept. 25.

Laporte, Ind., Sept. 21.—Miss Cora Beckwith, who declares that she will swim the rapids at Niagara Falls Sept. 25, says that nothing will change her decision to risk her life in the perilous feat which has caused the sacrifice of the lives of others.

"I have been swimming now, professionally, for eighteen years," says Miss Beckwith, "appearing both in this country and in Europe. For some years I appeared frequently with Captain Webb, who lost his life swimming the whirlpool rapids at Niagara Falls. I am planning to swim the rapids myself on Sept. ning to swim the rapids myself on Sept. 25 next, but I am confident that I will not meet Captain Webb's fate. For one reason, I am more buoyant that the reason, I am more buoyant that the captain was.
"I am going to try the feat on the American side. Captain Webb lost his life on the Canadian side. He insisted upon swimming there even against the advice of all his friends. He might have been more successful on the American advice of all his friends. He might have been more successful on the American side, but then his lack of buoyancy was against him. I also count upon my strength to get me through difficult places. Swimming does not tire me in the least, and the water weakness of which some bathers complain does not affect me at all. The distance through the rapids is only about three-quarters of a mile, and I am sure that I can swim and float through it."
