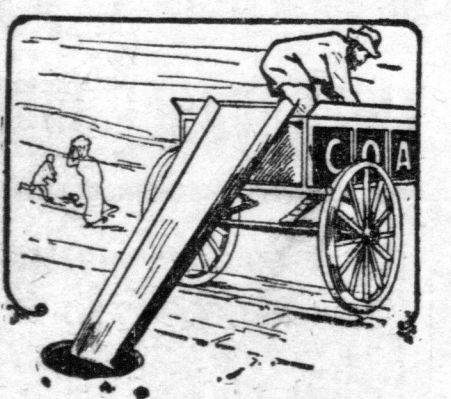

FIRE ESCAPES FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

On Fire Chief's Report No. 3 Committee Will Look Into the Subject.

No. 3 committee held its regular meeting last evening, and considered the report of Fire Chief Clark on his recent trip to the fire chiefs' convention in Washington. The chief reported it to be one of the best conventions he had ever attended. One of the most important papers was that on "Is fire prevention of more importance than fire protection?" It was pointed out that in Europe the losses by fire were much less than in America, and that was largely due to the method of construction of buildings in the old land, and the splendid systems of building inspection in vogue there. It was also shown by statistics that where the losses by fire were small, the fire brigade was very efficient and deserved most of the credit for such a condition.

The matter of fire protection for schools was the theme of a very interesting discussion, and it was the opinion of the convention that there should be fire escapes on all schools over one story high, and that the school children should be thoroughly instructed in the uses of such escapes. Ald. Booth thought that such a matter should be brought to the attention of the board of education of this city, as far as he knew there were no fire escapes on any of the schools of the city. The only means of escape in case of fire was through a main hallway, which, if a fire should break out in the stairway would offer no chance of escape for the children. It was a matter that the fire chief and the city engineer should look into.

Ald. Booth made a motion to that effect, and City Engineer Graydon and Fire Chief Clark were asked to make an inspection of the schools.

The narrow escape of the firemen at the corner of King and Richmond streets, as mentioned in The Advertiser of the other evening, was the subject of a very interesting discussion. Ald. Booth wanted to know if the street railway was living up to its rules in this matter. Some time ago the company had promised to slow up at this crossing, and it appears it was not being done.

"I would have some of their men arrested," said Ald. Booth, "just as the Grand Trunk employees are arrested, for blocking the streets. A fine or two would make the employees a trifle more observant of the rules."

Fire Chief Clark said that there was no excuse for the employees. Both the firemen and the street railway employees are warned by their rules to slow up at this crossing, and others, as they are dangerous. If they obey the rules there is no danger. If they disobey them there is grave danger.

The committee decided to warn the street railway employees, and insist upon their observing the rules.

M. J. Flanagan appealed against paying rental for his store on the lot which was filled up with bricks from Smallman & Ingram's store.

The committee decided to remit a portion of Mr. Flanagan's rental.

Ald. Gillean commended the committee that as directed he had settled with Miss Maud Jones for a dress ruined by water, for \$10.

This preaching revealed a strong rebuke in the Scripture, 'Faith without works is dead.' Faith, if it be more belief as a pendulum swinging between nothing and something, having no fixity. Faith, advanced to spiritual understanding, which rebukes sin of every kind and establishes the claims of God."

SCOOOL JANITORS ASK AN INCREASE

Ask Education Board to Grant Them \$75 a Room Per Annum.

No. 2 committee of the board of education had the janitors of the public schools before it yesterday afternoon, when the matter of the increase in their salaries was discussed. The present schedule is \$50 per room per annum, and the janitors are asking for \$75 a room. Dr. Tassell, chairman of No. 2 committee, questioned the janitors on their rules, and other matters pertaining to their work. On the answers given it was decided to revise the schedule for the janitors, and have them sent to each janitor.

Mr. W. Bruce, of Victoria school, declared that he worked fifteen hours a day at the school, rising at 3 o'clock in the morning and working until 7 in the evening. He did not think that the increase asked for was excessive. Other janitors spoke of the increase in the cost of assistance, and also the increased cost of living.

The committee decided to lay the matter of increases over until the next meeting.

Hunt Bros., in a communication to the committee, were willing to allow a rebate of 50 cents a ton on 110 tons of coal that was not up to the standard required by the board. It was agreed to send Hunt Bros a check for the balance due them, minus \$50.
