CHIEF OF BOY SCOUTS FETED AT DETROIT

Baden-Powell Proves Himself a "Good Scout" to the Michigan Metropolis.

Detroit, Feb. 6.—When the union men of the United States understand the real significance and aim of the Boy Scout movement, all opposition to the organization will vanish, as it has in England," declared Sir Robert Baden-Powell, K. C. B., K. C. V. O., founder of the Boy Scouts, English war hero, writer and lecturer, yesterday.

For nearly 15 hours yesterday the "hero of Mafeking" was escorted, dined, talked to and listened to by Detroiters. Individuals, groups and audiences—they found him a "good scout," and a thorough personification of his reputation.

After a banquet at the Hotel Detroit, where he was entertained by the Detroit Teachers' Association at an informal dinner at the Hotel Pontchartrain. From there he went for a brief address to 500 Boy Scouts at the Naval Reserves' headquarters, from which place he was escorted to the Light Guard armory, where he lectured under the auspices of the Detroit Teachers' Association on "Scouting in War and Peace." He left at 12:45 a.m. for Chicago.

Mayor Thompson sat beside Sir Robert at the informal dinner at the Hotel Pontchartrain.

There was no formal toast list, but anything of that sort for with a speech and lecture to follow, a quiet chat was deemed all that was necessary. Mayor Thompson extended the greetings of the city of Detroit, and organization that was doing much good among American boys and knitting their sympathies with those of their

brothers across the water. The guest of honor responded, and gave a brief sketch of the origin and aims of the work.
