STREET WATERING COST RAISED CENT A FOOT

It Is the Intention to Oil 18 Miles of Streets This Year.

Street watering will cost 4 cents a foot instead of 3 cents, the figures for last year and previous years.

This decision was arrived at on Monday evening at a meeting of No. 3 committee called for the purpose of dealing with the question of oiling the streets.

It was also decided to treat eighteen miles of streets with oil this coming season. About half this distance will be scarified, graveled, rolled and oiled.

City Engineer Wright explained to the committee that oiling had proved highly satisfactory last year, and he recommended that at least eighteen miles be undertaken this year.

The charge for this will be 4 cents a foot for one treatment," said Mr. Wright. "That will suffice in the majority of cases. If any more is needed another coat can be put on at 3 cents a foot. There are a number of streets, such as Waterloo, that should be rolled and graveled and oiled. This will give them an excellent road for three years, at a cost of 8 cents a foot, including the oiling. That is very reasonable, I think."

Four Cents a Foot.

"I would recommend that a charge of 4 cents a foot be made for street watering. You will remember last year we charged but 3 cents. The result was that we had not enough money to properly water the streets. When the foot spell came we could not go over the streets three times, the usual number, and consequently there were many complaints that the work was badly done. If we charged 4 cents we could do good work, and keep the dust down. We cannot do so at 3 cents a foot."

The committee thought this explanation satisfactory, and recommended that this charge be made.

Those present were Ald. Robinson, Ald. Ashplant, Ald. Murphy, Ald. Moore, Ald. Blandford, City Engineer Wright and Secretary Baker.

CITY AND COUNTY TALKING NEW JAIL

A Conference Was Held on Monday When Proposal Was Discussed.

Negotiations for the selection of a new site for the new county jail were opened up on Monday afternoon, when a committee composed of Warden Jos. T. Buttery, of Strathroy, Sheriff Cameron and Capt. T. E. Robson, had an interview with Mayor Graham, Ald. Moore, Ald. Robinson, Ald. Spittal, and other members of the council, relative to the matter.

In the opinion of Sheriff Cameron the present jail is inadequate to accommodate the prisoners, and there is no guarantee of their safety once they are incarcerated. He is endeavoring to bring the city and county together in an attempt to have a new structure erected to replace the present antiquated building.

The matter was informally discussed at the conference yesterday. The press were not furnished with any information as to what transpired, but the information leaked out as to the purpose of the interview.

Another meeting will be held in the immediate future, when the project will be discussed still further.

YOUNG CAR CHECKER WAS INSTANTLY KILLED

Alexander Manson Believed To Have Missed His Footing While at Work.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Tillsonburg, March 26. — Alexander A. Manson, aged 20, was instantly killed at the C. P. R. diamond here this morning. His remains were found horribly mangled on the tracks. Manson was a car checker for the C. P. R., and he was supposed to be riding about on the cars. It is supposed that while going about his work he missed his footing and fell under the cars.

Manson came from England two years ago intending to make his fortune and return. For some time he was employed in the local rural telephone exchange, and later went with the C. P. R. His only relative so far as is known here is an uncle who resides at Muswell Hill, London, Eng. He has been cabled.

Coroner Dr. Bennett will hold an inquest.

So far as can be learned no one saw the accident.

TRUSTEES INSPECTING CHESLEY AVE. SCHOOL

Lively Debate May Take Place Over Addition to Aberdeen.

Trustees W. T. Strong and Rev. J. Gibson Inkster made a tour of inspection of Chesley avenue school yesterday, and as a result it is expected that a lively debate will take place over the proposed addition to Aberdeen school, instead of Chesley avenue.

"The trustees should make a thorough canvass of the schools in the city," said Rev. Mr. Inkster, "and discover where changes are necessary and the like. The present situation is not known to most of us, and it should be before we undertake to expend so large sums of money. We are going to look over Chesley avenue today, and later we will see some of the others."

TRUSTEES MUST PAY \$400 AND ALL COSTS

Arbitration Concluded in London Township Land Case.

Judge Elliott, Mr. Thomas C. Knott and Mr. Charles Wakeling, sitting yesterday as arbitrators in the dispute between the school trustees of section 27, London Township, and Daniel Bacon, heard the evidence in the matter, and decided that the trustees must pay \$400 and costs for a certain piece of land adjoining the school property.

The land, which belonged to Mr. Bacon, was 8 rods by 15 rods, and was valued by the owner at \$500. An offer of \$200 was made by the school board, so the matter was sent to arbitration. Mr. Edmund Meredith, K.C., appeared for the school board, while Mr. John Macpherson represented Mr. Bacon.
