As the club will only need two catchers this season, and Bowerman has practically decided to be one o them, it is hard to see just what place on the team McWhirter and Reske

It is not unlikely that both men will be traded or sold to one of the other clubs. St. Thomas could use one of them, and perhaps one of the other teams will need a catcher before the season progresses very far.
