SITUATION IN DUBLIN IS NOT AT ALL REASSURING

Funeral of Rioter Was Attended By Thousands—Employers Are Determined To Fight the Unions To the End.

Dublin, Sept. 3.—Lines of people two miles long followed the hearse containing the body of Nolan, the laborer who was killed in the rioting in Sackville street on Sunday, to Glasnevin Cemetery today. Thousands of persons thronged the streets through which the cortege passed. All the workers on strike joined in the procession.

Maintained Order. The organizers of the demonstration promised to maintain order, and all police were withdrawn from streets along the route to the cemetery. Some were stationed at the cemetery gate pending the arrival of the body. They left when the funeral cortege arrived.

There was a panic in Sackville street when one of the horses drawing the hearse became restive. Someone shouted "The police!" and instantly there was a

general stampede to the side streets. Women dashed into the nearby stores and hotels. The hearse was deserted save for the driver and the police who remained at their posts. The incident is significant of the prevailing terror felt by the people where the police are concerned, equally only by their hate for the police.

City Is Quiet. The city was quiet today, but the situation is regarded as very dangerous, as the people are expected to seek revenge on the police at the first opportunity for the death of Nolan. The authorities have asked that detachments of the Royal Irish Constabulary be sent from the provinces to reinforce the Dublin police.

The determination of the large employers of labor to maintain the power of the unions was shown today, when two coal merchants carried out their threat not to employ any member of the Transport Workers' Union unless he resigns.

C. N. R. MEN AT HEAD OF CHATHAM ELECTRIC LINE

Head Office Is To Be Moved to Toronto Very Shortly.

Chatham, Sept. 3.—The annual meeting of the Chatham, Wallaceburg and Lake Erie Electric Railroad was held today. The majority of the members of the new board are Canadian Northern Railroad representatives. It includes D. B. Hanna, A. J. Mitchell, R. G. O. Thomson, Judge F. Phippen, and Mr. Morton, of Toronto; D. A. Gordon, of Wallaceburg, and J. G. Kerr, of Chatham. It is stated that the board will meet in Toronto shortly for organization.

It is also stated that the main office of the company will be moved from Chatham to Toronto.

T. W. Ralph, associated with the C. N. R. interests, has been named as auditor.

While no statement is being made at this time regarding future plans, it is understood that an aggressive campaign will be quickly undertaken.

BERLIN NEXT YEAR. [Special to The Advertiser.] Berlin, Sept. 3.—Sir William MacKenzie has made it known to local citizens following his return from Europe that the Canadian Northern Railway would reach Berlin next year with its radial line. It was intended to have the line completed from Toronto to Guelph and Berlin by this fall, but this is impossible. The company will also construct branch lines to Waterloo and Galt, but has not planned to go farther west than Berlin next year.

JUMPED OVERBOARD

[Canadian Press.] New York, Sept. 3.—The steamship Oceanic, which arrived today from Southampton, during the voyage lost one of her crew, a coal passer, who jumped overboard while suffering from heart stroke. The passer was Arthur Robinson, of Southampton, England. The passengers subscribed a purse for his widow.

Jack Steele, a second-cabin passenger, 16 years old, climbed through the porthole of his cabin while walking in his sleep, and was rescued just in time to save his life.

London, England, Sept. 3.—The Grand Freemasons' Lodge of England, under the presidency of Pro-Grand Master Lord Amphil, last night adopted a motion that the sum of \$500 be given as from the funds of the grand lodge and devoted for the purpose of presenting a suitable gift to Prince Arthur of Connaught, on the occasion of his marriage with H.R.H. the Duchess of Fife.

No ceremonial program for the royal wedding has yet been prepared. Present will very largely govern the ceremony, which will be on the lines of the wedding of the King and Queen.

The Duke of Connaught has visited London almost daily since his return from Sweden, but the duchess, who is very much better, has not yet come up from Baginboto.

MILL BURNED

Levi Bowman Loses Whole Plant For Second Time.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Berlin, Sept. 3.—The planing and lumber mill owned by Levi M. Bowman was totally destroyed by fire early today. With the assistance of farmers and the St. Jacobs volunteer fire brigade, a large quantity of lumber was saved. The cause of the blaze is unknown. The loss will be \$4,000. Thirteen years ago Mr. Bowman lost his plant the same way.

UNEARTH FRAUD

Government Analyst Find Fake in Florida Water and Bay Rum.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Sept. 3.—Extensive frauds in the manufacture of Florida water and bay rum are indicated by a bulletin giving results of recent analysis by the inland revenue department. Many of the samples of these goods contained 33.13 per cent of alcohol, mixed with wood alcohol. Some samples of Florida water contained methyl alcohol.

QUAKE AT MESSINA

[Canadian Press.] Messina, Sicily, Sept. 3.—A strong undulatory perpendicular earthquake caused a panic among the population of this city early today. It lasted six seconds. The people, who had been already alarmed by previous shocks, abandoned their houses and fled to the open spaces.

A BUMPER WHEAT CROP.

Thousands of Men Required—This Year's Harvest Promises To Be the Largest in the History of Canada.

According to present indications the wheat crop of 1913 will be the greatest ever harvested in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, thus requiring the farm laborers of the west to assist in harvesting the world's greatest bread basket.

The governments of the respective provinces state that many thousand men will be required for this year's harvest. They will have to be principally recruited from Ontario, and the prosperity of Canada depends on securing labor promptly. The Canadian Pacific, on which companies will fall practically the entire task of transporting the men to the West, is already making special arrangements for this year. Excursions from points in Ontario to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta will be run and special trains operated, making the trip in about thirty-six hours and avoiding any change of cars or transfers.
