-Chief Justice R. M. Meredith



In refusing to discharge Rudolph Beraulk, a military prisoner, held at Toronto, and in making the conditional remand absolute, Chief Justice R. M. Meredith, whose home is in this city, is reported by the Canadian Press to have said yesterday:

"It should be plain to everyone that in the stress and danger to the life of any nation at war, the courts chould be exceedingly careful not to hamper the actions of those expressly charged with the safety of the nation, careful among other things not to take up the time and attention of those who

should be fighting the enemy in the field, in fighting lawsuits in the law courts over private rights. "It is not a time when the prisoner is to have the benefit of the doubt, it is a time when in all things, great and small, the country must have every possible advantage, WHEN IT MUST BE THE GENERAL SAFETY FIRST IN ALL THINGS ALWAYS, until

the final victory is won, even though individuals may suffer meanwhile. "Private wrongs can be righted then, while final defeat would not only prevent that, but bring untold

GERMAN RESERVIST ADMITTED LYING. Mr. Justice Middleton at Toronto yesterday fixed bail at \$100,000, in the case of Emil Nerlich, a naturalized German, who is accused of aiding a German reservist, Lieutenant Arthur Zirzow, Zirzow obtained immunity by at first denying to Judge Coatsworth his connection with the German army.

In reporting the case the Toronto Mail and Empire of this morning has the following to say: "The only evidence taken in the police court was that of Arthur Zirzow, the German lieutenant whom
