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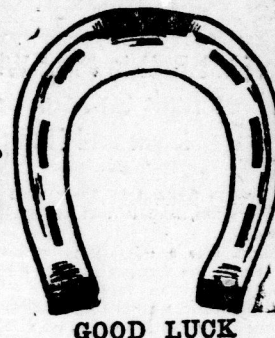

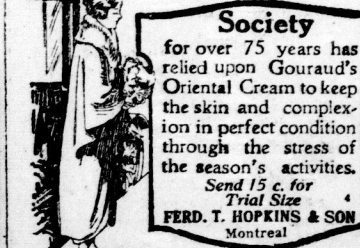

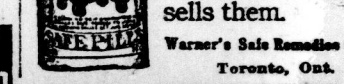

HOME ECONOMICS

A good home-made polish for brass and copper is as follows: Take two ounces, or a quarter of a cupful of dilute oxalic acid, a box of electro-silicon, half a cupful of pure alcohol, and a pint of kerosene oil. Put the acid and alcohol in a bottle, add the electro-silicon and shake well before using. Badly tarnished brass and copper should first be washed in solution of washing soda to remove the grease, then polished with this recipe, wiped dry and polished with a clean soft cloth or chamois.

There are several good brass polishes on the market, any one of which will remove ordinary stains, but brass must in any case be well polished; nothing takes the place of firm, swift rubbing with a good cloth.
