Put the silicon into a bottle, add alcohol, acid and oil. Remember that this is poison. Shake well before using. Badly tarnished brass and copper should first be washed in solution of washing soda to remove the grease, then polished with this recipe, wiped dry and polished with a clean soft cloth or chamois.


