## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

### COLLISION IN FOG.

British Steamer is Run Down by a French Liner Near Dover.  
Dover, Eng., July 5.—The British steamer Whakane, running to New Zealand, was towed here yesterday in a sinking condition and beached. The Whakane was in collision with the French liner Circé. The latter was damaged, but was able to proceed on her voyage to Rotterdam. No lives were lost.

The Whakane had 300 persons aboard. She also carried a large number of valuable horses. It was an exceedingly narrow escape from a terrible disaster. Immediately after the vessel struck, the Circé, with the help of another steamer, took the Whakane in tow, but the hawsers broke. The Circé then came to Dover for assistance. Several tugs put out and proceeded to tow the sinking steamer. When the liner was towed here she presented an extraordinary appearance, with her stern lying deep in the water. All the crew were mustered forward. Six salvagers and other crew were landing assistance in the difficult operation of towing the sinking steamer to the beach. The Circé had crashed into her amidships, making a great rent in her side.

Car Wreck Buggy.  
Hamilton, July 5.—A street car struck a buggy at the corner of King William and James streets about 10:30 p.m. Monday, Aug. 2nd and Civic Holiday.

A meeting of Council and of the King street property owners will be held on Friday of this week at the Council Chamber, to decide on the class of pavement to be laid.

To Clean Up An Alley.  
Dynamite on track.

Mount Morris, N.Y., July 5.—Some dynamited the Erie tracks in three different places at Dalton, a village about a mile south of Nunda. Saturday morning at an early hour, either in a "Fourth of July" spirit, or for the purpose of wrecking the last train which passed through Dalton west-bound at about 5:30 a.m. Three charges of the explosive were placed only a few rods apart just west and east of the depot. The last train for Buffalo was the last to pass over the dynamited track, and while it passed over it without wrecking the cars or injuring any of the passengers, three large pieces of rail were broken entirely out of the track was torn up. The missing rail was discovered by the crew of the extra train going east soon after.

Canadian Injured In Seattle.  
Seattle, Wn., July 5.—Mrs. Geo. H. Munroe of Toronto lies dangerously hurt at the Miner Hospital here. She has a broken left wrist, deep cut, which just missed her left temple, sprained left ankle and several bruises on the body. She may have internal injuries.

Dead Bandit Identified.  
Vancouver, July 5.—The engineer and fireman of the C.P.R. train which was held up two weeks ago at Buckle, B.C., have identified the body of the man shot by Constable Decker on Monday night at Ashcroft as that of the leader of the train robbers. The dead man is one who held up the engineer after crawling over the tender. It is admitted that Constable Decker's murderer, the second train robber, must have escaped from that part of the country. Tired passengers have returned to Ashcroft and Kamloops after several days of fruitless search.

Lady Grey Has Scarlet Fever.  
Ottawa, July 5.—Her Excellency Lady Grey and Captain Newton, A.D.C., are ill with scarlet fever at Government House. Both patients are making favorable progress. The disease was contracted during Lady Grey's visit to Toronto attending the International Women's Council, on which she was accompanied by Capt. Newton. It developed on the return journey on Thursday.

Looks Good for Canada.  
London, July 5.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—The Financial Times says that after the speeches of Earl Grey, Lord Strathcona, Hon. Mr. Fielding, Hon. Mr. Oliver and E. L. Borden on Dominion Day, the British investor can entertain no doubt about the Dominion's brilliant future. Surveying the list of Canadian visitors, it thinks Canada is likely to boom in 1909 as never before.

Huntsville Man Drowned.  
Huntsville, July 5.—As the steamer Algonquin was passing the mouth of the canal on her way to the portage, the body of a man was seen lying in shallow water. It proved to be that of Joe McIlwain, 60 years old, of Huntsville. He left Huntsville Friday night in a punt and rowed over Fairy Lake, evidently with the intention of going to "Deerhurst."

Talked With John Burns.  
London, July 5.—Earl Grey, accompanied by Hon. Frank Oliver and J. Obed Smith, had an interview Sunday with John Burns. Mr. Oliver, interviewed by the Canadian Associated Press, said: "There is nothing to tell you. We just had a talk on emigration matters in a general sort of way." Mr. Oliver is leaving today for the continent.

LONDON, June 29.—London cables for cattle are firm, at 14c to 15c per lb. for Canadian, and 13c to 14c for American. Hogs are quoted at 10c to 11c per lb.

Toronto Live Stock.  
TORONTO, June 29.—The railways reported 90 carloads of live stock at the City Market, consisting of 1,432 cattle, 1,980 hogs, 1,065 sheep and lambs, 364 calves and 8 horses.

There was not a large number on sale. Export steers sold from \$5.50 to \$6.25; export bulls, at \$4.75 to \$5.25.

Butchers' steers and heifers sold from \$4.75 to \$5.25; cows, \$3.50 to \$4.25. Milk and feeders.

There was moderate supply of milkers and springers, which sold at \$3.00 to \$3.50 each, as well as seen by sales given.

About 400 head calves sold at \$2 to \$3 per cwt. for the bulk with a few very choice quality at \$3.50 per cwt.

Eleven hundred sheep and lambs were on sale, with a few choice. Export steers sold at \$2.50 to \$3 per cwt.; rams, \$3 to \$3.50; spring lambs, at \$4 to \$5 per lb.

There are as many different prices as buyers. We heard of \$7.25, \$7.50, \$7.75 paid for hogs, and \$8.25 to \$8.75 for selected fed and watered.

The typewriter works employ 2,100 people, mostly men, and the weekly payroll is about \$30,000.

Grain Growing In Alberta.  
Calgary, June 30.—From all sections of Southern Alberta exceptionally optimistic crop reports are received. In places where wheat was only 12 to 20 inches high last week, it is now 20 to 40 inches, the average height of grain in some districts being reported at 25 inches.

Bay's Close Call.  
Brantford, June 30.—Walter Hunt, aged 14, was rescued from drowning in the Grand River by Alex McRobb. His body had been in the water for ten minutes before recovered and the life-saving crew of the fire department worked over him for an hour.

## Fireman Rescues Aeronaut.

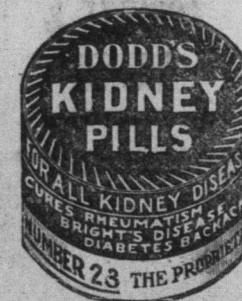
