The university is debarred from teaching and the college from conferring degrees; on the other hand, the university examines the students of the college and grants them degrees and academic standing. Obviously, the one is incomplete without the other, and it is equally obvious that every one who is admitted to the privileges of the one ought to be admitted to the privileges of the other, especially as they are supported by the same public endowment,

dmitted to the university examina tions, they should sooner or later seek admission to the college lecture-rooms. mission to the college lecture rooms.

This is equivalent to telling them that they would, if admitted, either be guilty of breaches of discipline themselves or provoke disorderly and immoral conduct on the part of the male students.
