In fact, the whole life of the porker is made up largely of this sort of wild life and the meat that is produced in the fall is anything but tender. If it were not for the fall erop of a corns, which tends to fatten the meat rapidly, the southern pork crop would be pretty poor stuff. As it is, the meat is used chiefly for home consumption and even some of the local markets deal in western and eastern pork.
