Toronto, Nov. 7.—The sudden revival of activity on the part of the live stock dealers which characterized yesterday's market continued to-day in spite of a much heavier run. The bulk of the shipments, however, were composed of common and medium grades of cattle, which made the few loads of choice butcher stilled the chieft of much greater course. made the few loads of choice butcher cattle the object of much greater competition. The result was that to-day's top price for butcher cattle went 25c higher than yesterday, when the best cattle were bought for export purposed.
