The barn of Fred Feltz, south of Wheatley, containing the crop of tobacco from 16 acres, was destroyed by fire early Friday morning.

Earl Holton, of Blytheswood, has turned his peach orchard into stove-wood, which he considers a more profitable proposition than buying coal at \$23 per ton.

The cost of meals at C.P.R. hotels and in C.P.R. dining cars was lowered at New Years. Several cuts will be required before they are within the means of ordinary people.

In Detroit twenty-six intending bridegrooms are said to have recently returned their marriage licenses to the county clerk, all giving the same reason. No job, no wedding.

When the U.F.O. executive meets in East Lambton to select a candidate for the approaching election for the House of Commons the name of ex-Warden Simpson will be prominently before them.

A St. Mary's citizen being asked the other day why he didn't run for Councillor said "He didn't know whether his great-grandfather was a chicken thief or not and he did not want to know."

The death occurred in Caradoc on Saturday of Floyd Ogg, a young man in his 23rd year. He was killed in the head by a horse four years ago and it is believed death resulted from the injury.

By presence of mind Percy Wilson of Parkhill saved his life. While driving a tractor across Sauble bridge the bridge gave way letting the engine drop into the stream.

Wilson grasped the limb of a tree and saved himself from falling with it.

Mr. Wm. Thompson, Dawn Tp., met with a painful accident one day last week while helping to cut corn stalks. Mr. David Lettich's, the side of the mow on which he was working in some manner slipped off and he fell to the floor about 44 feet and broke his ankle.

Mrs. Lucas, wife of I. B. Lucas, a former attorney-general, died in Toronto. L. D. Caldwell, representing the New York Life Insurance Co., at Hamilton and Sarnia, has the honor of being fifth among 7,200 agents of the company in Canada and the United States for the volume of business written in November and December, 1920, and also stands fourth on number of applications written.

An impressive service was held in Christ church, Petrolia, Sunday morning, when a brass memorial tablet bearing the names of 42 men who enlisted from the congregation was formally unveiled and dedicated. Prominent on the tablet were the names of the two men who had fallen—Eugene Fisher and James Gillies.

A petition largely signed by the ratepayers of Caradoc, Metcalfe, Ekfrid and Strathroy, will be presented to Middlesex County Council at the January session, requesting the council to construct a proper gravel road, leading from the present county road near Cairngorm, along the townline between Caradoc, Metcalfe and Ekfrid, to the Longwood road at Melbourne.

Canadian school children during the months of September and October last deposited \$96,188 in the 47 penny banks now in operation in connection with the Public Schools. This is an increase over the same period a year ago of \$6,987.30 and over 1918 of \$40,871.93. Guelph made the highest average monthly deposit, 92 cents for each child. The average for all Canada was 43 cents.

The scheme of the laymen of the Methodist church in Canada and Newfoundland, which has for its object the getting of better salaries for the ministers, has met with a response beyond expectations. The total increases brought about by the campaign is \$400,000, and, while the advances are not such as to make any individual pastor wealthy, the appeal of the laymen has been accorded generous support. There are about 200 circuits in Canada and Newfoundland, making an average increase of \$200 per circuit. The minimum salary, which was fixed at \$1,500 per annum, has been in almost every instance arranged for.
