Miss Preston had with her patterns for all of these and a number of members of the Institute stayed after the meeting to cut off any pattern desired by any one present. The lecture all through was most novel and instructive.

This is only one of the many ways in which the Women's Institutes of our country try to benefit the communities which they work. Miss Evelyn Hastings added to the enjoyment of the afternoon by giving two readings, "The Courtship of Larry O'Dee" humorous; and "The Cattle Thief."
