The place should be afterward carefully rinced in cold water and given a final polish with a clean soft cloth. There is no real remedy for finger marks on light wallpaper, but sometimes simply rubbing with a clean cloth will help. Water accidentally spilt on wallpaper will usually not injure it, and should left alone to dry, as interference ause a lasting stain.


